5	SECTION 1. Section 302.252(1), Labor Code, is amended to					
6	read as follows:					
7	(1) "Industry-recognized apprenticeship program"

9	[ <del>(A) provides on-the-job training, preparatory</del>					
10	instruction, supplementary instruction, or related instruction in					
11	an occupation that has been recognized as an apprenticeable					
12	occupation by the Office of Apprenticeship of the United States					
13	Department of Labor; or					
14	[ <del>(B)</del> ] is certified <u>by the commission</u> as an					
15	industry-recognized apprenticeship program [ <del>by a third-party</del>					
16	certifier that has received from the United States Department of					
17	Labor a favorable determination of qualification to award that					
18	<pre>certification].</pre>					
19	SECTION 2. Subchapter I, Chapter 302, Labor Code, is					
20	amended by adding Section 302.2555 to read as follows:					
21	Sec. 302.2555. EXCLUDED PROGRAMS. The commission may not					
22	certify or award a grant under this subchapter to a training program					
23	in the construction industry, as that industry is described by the					
24	North American Industry Classification System sector number 23.					

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SECTION 3. Section 302.257, Labor Code, is amended by 1 amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (a-1) to read as 2 3 follows: 4 (a) The commission shall adopt rules to administer and enforce this subchapter, including rules establishing the criteria 5 and process for the commission to certify a training program as an 6 7 industry-recognized apprenticeship program for purposes of this 8 subchapter. (a-1) The certification criteria established under 9 Subsection (a) must include that the training program: 10 (1) lead to the attainment of skills that: 11 12 (A) are customarily learned in a practical way through a structured, systematic program of on-the-job supervised 13 14 training; and 15 (B) are clearly identified and commonly 16 recognized throughout an industry; 17 (2) involve manual, mechanical, or technical skills or knowledge requiring significant on-the-job work experience; and 18 19 (3) require related instruction to supplement the on-the-job training. 20 SECTION 4. As soon as practicable after the effective date 21 of this Act, the Texas Workforce Commission shall adopt the rules 22 required by Section 302.257, Labor Code, as amended by this Act. 23 24 SECTION 5. The change in law made by this Act applies only to a grant awarded under Subchapter I, Chapter 302, Labor Code, on 25 or after the effective date of this Act. A grant awarded before 26 that date is governed by the law in effect on the date the grant was 27

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awarded, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.
 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.

9 [(A) provides on-the-job training, preparatory 10 instruction, supplementary instruction, or related instruction in 11 an occupation that has been recognized as an apprenticeable 12 occupation by the Office of Apprenticeship of the United States 13 Department of Labor, or

14 [(B)] is certified by the commission as an 15 industry-recognized apprenticeship program [by a third-party 16 certifier that has received from the United States Department of 17 Labor a favorable determination of qualification to award that 18 certification].

19 SECTION 2. Section 302.257, Labor Code, is amended by 20 amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (a-1) to read as 21 follows:

(a) The commission shall adopt rules to administer and
enforce this subchapter, including rules establishing the criteria
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industry-recognized apprenticeship program for purposes of this 1 2 subchapter. (a-1) The certification criteria established under 3 4 Subsection (a) must include that the training program: 5 (1) lead to the attainment of skills that: 6 (A) are customarily learned in a practical way through a tructured, systematic program of on-the-job supervised 7 training; and 8 9 (B) are clearly identified and commonly recognized throughout an industry; 10 (2) involve manual, mechanical, or technical skills or 11 knowledge requiring significant on-the-job work experience; and 12 (3) require related instruction to supplement the 13 on-the-job training. 14 SECTION 3.
