## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the implementation of an instructionally supportive
3	assessment program and the adoption and administration of
4	assessment instruments in public schools.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	ARTICLE 1. TRANSITION TO INSTRUCTIONALLY SUPPORTIVE ASSESSMENT
7	PROGRAM
8	SECTION 1.001. Section 39.022, Education Code, is amended
9	to read as follows:
10	Sec. 39.022. <u>INSTRUCTIONALLY</u> <u>SUPPORTIVE</u> ASSESSMENT
11	PROGRAM. (a) To ensure school accountability for student
12	achievement that achieves the goals provided under Section 4.002,
13	the agency [The State Board of Education by rule] shall create and
14	implement $\underline{an\ instructionally\ supportive}\ [a]\ statewide\ assessment$
15	program that:
16	(1) provides for progress monitoring;
17	(2) is balanced, innovative, and streamlined; and
18	(3) is based on essential knowledge and skills adopted
19	by the State Board of Education under Section 28.002 [knowledge-
20	and skills-based to ensure school accountability for student
21	achievement that achieves the goals provided under Section 4.002].
22	(b) The primary objective of an instructionally supportive
23	assessment program created and implemented under this section is to
24	benefit the students of this state.

- 1 <u>(c) The agency</u> [After adopting rules under this section, the
- 2 State Board of Education | shall consider the importance of
- 3 maintaining stability in the instructionally supportive
- 4 [statewide] assessment program when modifying the program
- 5 [adopting any subsequent modification of the rules].
- 6  $\underline{\text{(d)}}$  [\frac{\text{(b)}}{}] It is the policy of this state that the
- 7 <u>instructionally supportive</u> [statewide] assessment program be
- 8 designed to:
- 9 (1) provide information regarding student academic
- 10 achievement and learning progress to:
- 11 (A) public schools for the purpose of improving
- 12 student instruction [provide assessment instruments that are as
- 13 short as practicable];
- 14 (B) students, parents, and teachers for the
- 15 purpose of guiding learning objectives; and
- (C) education researchers for the purpose of
- 17 comparing student academic achievement and learning progress data
- 18 at the national and statewide levels;
- 19 (2) evaluate the achievement level and learning
- 20 progress of each assessed student in reading language arts,
- 21 mathematics, science, and social studies;
- 22 (3) provide information to the agency for the purpose
- 23 of making decisions regarding public school accountability, campus
- 24 recognition, and the improvement of public school operations and
- 25 management;
- 26 (4) identify the educational strengths and needs of
- 27 individual students and the readiness of those students to be

- 1 promoted to the next grade level or to graduate from high school;
- 2 (5) assess whether educational goals and curricular
- 3 standards are being met at the campus, district, and state levels;
- 4 (6) provide information to help evaluate and develop
- 5 educational programs and policies; and
- 6 (7) provide instructional staff with immediate,
- 7 <u>actionable</u>, and useful information regarding student achievement
- 8 of standards and benchmarks that may be used to improve the staff's
- 9 delivery of student instruction [and
- 10 [(2) minimize the disruption to the educational
- 11 program].
- 12 (e) Each school district and open-enrollment charter school
- 13 shall administer assessment instruments as required under this
- 14 chapter in accordance with the instructionally supportive
- 15 <u>assessment program.</u>
- SECTION 1.002. Subchapter B, Chapter 39, Education Code, is
- 17 amended by adding Sections 39.0225 and 39.0226 to read as follows:
- 18 Sec. 39.0225. TRANSITION OF ASSESSMENT PROGRAM. (a)
- 19 Except as otherwise provided by this section, not later than the
- 20 beginning of the 2027-2028 school year, the agency shall transition
- 21 the program for assessment instruments administered under this
- 22 subchapter from the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness
- 23 (STAAR) assessment program to the instructionally supportive
- 24 assessment program described by Section 39.022.
- 25 (b) The agency shall contract with a nationally recognized
- 26 provider of assessment instruments for the purpose of making the
- 27 transition described by Subsection (a).

- 1 (c) Students shall continue to be assessed under the State
- 2 of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness (STAAR) assessment
- 3 program until the instructionally supportive assessment program
- 4 described by Section 39.022 is available beginning with the
- 5 2027-2028 school year.
- 6 (d) During the 2025-2026, 2026-2027, and 2027-2028 school
- 7 years, the agency, school districts, and open-enrollment charter
- 8 schools shall conduct any field testing of questions for assessment
- 9 instruments proposed to be adopted or developed under Section
- 10 39.023 necessary to implement the transition under this section.
- 11 (e) Not later than February 15, 2027, the agency shall
- 12 submit to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the
- 13 house of representatives, and the chairs of the standing
- 14 legislative committees with primary jurisdiction over public
- 15 school assessments a report regarding the status of the
- 16 implementation of the instructionally supportive assessment
- 17 program described by Section 39.022.
- 18 (f) This section expires September 1, 2029.
- 19 Sec. 39.0226. ASSESSMENT INSTRUMENT STUDY. (a) The
- 20 commissioner shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with a
- 21 public institution of higher education to conduct a study on items
- 22 proposed to be included in an assessment instrument required to be
- 23 administered under Section 39.023(a) under the instructionally
- 24 supportive assessment program described by Section 39.022. The
- 25 study must determine whether, for each item that is designed to be
- 26 on grade level, the item:
- 27 (1) is written at a reading level appropriate for

- 1 students at that grade level; and 2 (2) includes only: 3 (A) passages, questions, answers, or other content aligned with the essential knowledge and skills adopted by 4 the State Board of Education under Section 28.002 for the 5 applicable subject for that grade level or a previous grade level; 6 7 and 8 (B) passages written at a reading level not 9 higher than that grade level. (b) Not later than December 1, 2028, the commissioner shall 10 submit to the legislature and the chairs of the standing 11 12 legislative committees with primary jurisdiction over primary and secondary education a report that includes the results of the study 13 14 conducted under Subsection (a). 15 (c) This section expires December 31, 2028. 16 SECTION 1.003. Section 39.023, Education Code, is amended 17 by amending Subsections (a), (a-3), (c), (h), (i), and (l) and adding Subsection (q) to read as follows: 18
- 19 In creating and implementing the instructionally supportive assessment program under Section 39.022, the [The] 20 agency shall adopt or develop appropriate beginning-of-year, 21 middle-of-year, and end-of-year [criterion-referenced] assessment 22 instruments designed to assess essential knowledge and skills in 23 24 reading language arts, mathematics, social studies, and science. Except as provided by Subsection (a-2), all students, other than 25 students assessed under Subsection (b) or (l) or exempted under 26 27 Section 39.027, shall be assessed in:

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1 (1) mathematics, annually in grades three through
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2 eight;

- 3 (2) reading <u>language arts</u>, annually in grades three
- 4 through eight;
- 5 (3) social studies, in grade eight;
- 6 (4) science, in grades five and eight; and
- 7 (5) any other subject and grade required by federal
- 8 law.
- 9 (a-3) The agency may not adopt or develop  $\underline{an}$  [ $\underline{a}$
- 10 <u>criterion-referenced</u>] assessment instrument under this section
- 11 based on common core state standards as defined by Section
- 12 28.002(b-1). This subsection does not prohibit the use of college
- 13 advanced placement tests or international baccalaureate
- 14 examinations as those terms are defined by Section 28.051.
- 15 (c) The agency shall also adopt or develop end-of-course
- 16 assessment instruments for secondary-level courses in Algebra I,
- 17 biology, English I, English II, and United States history and
- 18 provide for the availability of optional beginning-of-year and
- 19 middle-of-year assessment instruments for those courses. The
- 20 Algebra I end-of-course assessment instrument must be administered
- 21 with the aid of technology, but may include one or more parts that
- 22 prohibit the use of technology. The English I and English II
- 23 end-of-course assessment instruments must each assess essential
- 24 knowledge and skills in both reading and writing and must provide a
- 25 single score. [A school district shall comply with State Board of
- 26 Education rules regarding administration of the assessment
- 27 instruments listed in this subsection. If a student is in a special

- education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, the student's 1 admission, review, and dismissal committee shall determine whether 2 any allowable modification is necessary in administering to the student an assessment instrument required under this subsection. 4 5 The State Board of Education shall administer the assessment instruments. An end-of-course assessment instrument may be 6 administered in multiple parts over more than one day. The State 7 Board of Education shall adopt a schedule for the administration of end-of-course assessment instruments that complies with the 9 10 requirements of Subsection (c-3).
- (h) The agency shall notify school districts and campuses of the results of assessment instruments administered under this section in accordance with the timeline provided by Section 39.02301 [not later than the 21st day after the date the assessment instrument is administered]. The school district shall:
- (1) disclose to each district teacher the results of assessment instruments administered to students taught by the teacher in the subject for the school year in which the assessment instrument is administered; and
- 20 (2) provide to the parent of a student enrolled in the 21 district:
- (A) the results of each assessment instrument
  administered under this section to the student; and
- (B) instructions for accessing any online portal
  maintained by the agency that provides results of assessment
  instruments administered to the student.
- 27 (i) The provisions of this section and Section 39.02301[ $\tau$

- 1 except Subsection  $(d)_{r}$ ] are subject to modification by rules
- 2 adopted under Section 39.001 [39.022]. Each assessment instrument
- 3 adopted or developed under those rules [and each assessment
- 4 instrument required under Subsection (d) must be reliable and
- 5 valid and must meet any applicable federal requirements for
- 6 measurement of student progress.
- 7 (1) The <u>agency</u> [State Board of Education] shall adopt rules
- 8 for the administration of the assessment instruments adopted under
- 9 Subsection (a) in Spanish to emergent bilingual students in grades
- 10 three through five, as defined by Section 29.052, whose primary
- 11 language is Spanish, and who are not otherwise exempt from the
- 12 administration of an assessment instrument under Section
- 39.027(a)(1) or (2). Each emergent bilingual student whose primary
- 14 language is Spanish, other than a student to whom Subsection (b)
- 15 applies, may be assessed using assessment instruments in Spanish
- 16 under this subsection for up to three years or assessment
- 17 instruments in English under Subsection (a). The language
- 18 proficiency assessment committee established under Section 29.063
- 19 shall determine which students are administered assessment
- 20 instruments in Spanish under this subsection.
- 21 (q) The agency shall approve a list of alternative
- 22 <u>norm-referenced assessment instruments that meet the requirements</u>
- 23 of this subchapter and that a school district or open-enrollment
- 24 charter school may administer in place of a beginning-of-year or
- 25 <u>middle-of-year assessment instrument adopted or developed under</u>
- 26 this section. The agency shall:
- 27 (1) ensure the list approved under this subsection

- 1 includes multiple alternative assessment instruments; and
- 2 (2) adopt a process by which a school district or
- 3 open-enrollment charter school may submit to the agency an
- 4 assessment instrument to be included on the list approved under
- 5 this subsection.
- 6 SECTION 1.004. Subchapter B, Chapter 39, Education Code, is
- 7 amended by adding Section 39.02301 to read as follows:
- 8 Sec. 39.02301. ADOPTION OR DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION
- 9 REQUIREMENTS FOR ASSESSMENT INSTRUMENTS. (a) An assessment
- 10 instrument adopted or developed under Section 39.023 must:
- 11 (1) measure student performance in relation to the
- 12 essential knowledge and skills adopted by the State Board of
- 13 Education under Section 28.002 for the subject area and grade level
- 14 being assessed;
- 15 (2) include items that have been evaluated for
- 16 readability using research-based readability metrics approved by
- 17 the agency in consultation with the advisory committees established
- 18 under Section 39.02302;
- 19 (3) meet industry standards of validity and
- 20 reliability;
- 21 (4) comply with applicable requirements under federal
- 22 <u>law</u>, including peer review requirements; and
- 23 (5) be designed to report student academic growth,
- 24 including by:
- 25 (A) reporting a student's norm-referenced growth
- 26 based on a comparison of the student's performance on the
- 27 assessment instrument to the student's performance on a previously

- 1 administered assessment instrument, as applicable, to measure
- 2 through-year growth;
- 3 (B) for an end-of-year or end-of-course
- 4 assessment instrument, reporting year-over-year growth in student
- 5 achievement; and
- 6 (C) for a beginning-of-year or middle-of-year
- 7 assessment instrument, being adaptive to each student to measure
- 8 and report individual student growth.
- 9 (b) Before an assessment instrument adopted or developed
- 10 under Section 39.023(a) may be administered under that subsection,
- 11 the assessment instrument must, on the basis of empirical evidence,
- 12 be determined to be valid and reliable by the advisory committees
- 13 established under Section 39.02302 or an entity that is, as
- 14 determined by the commissioner, independent of the agency and of
- 15 any other entity that developed the assessment instrument.
- 16 (c) Before an item may be included on an assessment
- 17 instrument administered under Section 39.023 that was developed by
- 18 the agency, the item must be reviewed and approved by a committee
- 19 composed of teachers in this state. The agency shall form each
- 20 committee by inviting a total of approximately 40 teachers
- 21 representing each region of this state who teach the grade level and
- 22 subject area assessed by the items under review to participate in
- 23 the committee. For each proposed item, at least three-quarters of
- 24 participating committee members must agree that:
- 25 (1) the item is aligned with the essential knowledge
- 26 and skills adopted by the State Board of Education under Section
- 27 28.002 for the applicable grade level and subject area;

(2) the item is appropriate for the grade level and 1 2 subject area being assessed and is written at an appropriate reading level for the grade level being assessed; 3 4 (3) the item is free from bias and factual error; and (4) students in the member's classroom would have an 5 opportunity to learn the content included in the item before the 6 administration of the applicable end-of-year or end-of-course 7 8 assessment instrument. 9 The writing portion of a reading language arts assessment instrument adopted or developed under Section 39.023 10 must be designed to assess writing using open-ended questions that 11 12 are: 13 (1) grade-level appropriate; 14 (2) administered separately; and 15 (3) scored using a process that: 16 (A) involves classroom teachers in setting 17 grading standards; and 18 (B) allows for a school district 19 open-enrollment charter school to submit student responses for 20 rescoring. 21 (e) For an end-of-year or end-of-course assessment instrument adopted or developed under Section 39.023, the agency 22 shall adopt or develop criterion-referenced assessment instruments 23 24 designed to assess and report student performance for, at minimum, each performance standard under Section 39.0241. 25 26 (f) In setting performance levels for a criterion-referenced assessment instrument adopted or developed 27

- under Subsection (e), the commissioner shall implement procedures 1 to maintain the validity and reliability of the assessment 2 instrument, including procedures for field testing items approved 3 by the teacher committees described by Subsection (c). Except as 4 5 necessary to comply with college readiness recommendations made by the commissioner of higher education under Section 39.0241(a-1), 6 7 the commissioner shall ensure the performance levels are set at 8 levels consistent with performance levels set for previous school years, including by implementing procedures that equate the 9 10 performance levels or by conducting standards-setting processes. (g) On or before September 1 of each year, the commissioner 11
- shall make the following information available on the agency's

  Internet website for each criterion-referenced assessment

  instrument administered under Section 39.023(a), (c), or (l):
- 15 <u>(1) the number of questions on the assessment</u> 16 instrument;
- (2) the number of questions that must be answered correctly to achieve satisfactory performance as determined by the commissioner under Section 39.0241(a);
- 20 (3) the number of questions that must be answered 21 correctly to achieve satisfactory performance under the college 22 readiness performance standard as provided by Section 39.0241; and
- 23 <u>(4) the corresponding scale scores.</u>
- (h) An assessment instrument adopted or developed under

  Section 39.023 must be designed to support accommodations for

  students in a special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter

  17 29. If a student is in a special education program under Subchapter

- 1 A, Chapter 29, the student's admission, review, and dismissal
- 2 committee shall determine whether any allowable accommodation is
- 3 necessary in administering to the student an assessment instrument
- 4 required under Section 39.023.
- 5 (i) The agency shall adopt a schedule for the administration
- 6 of assessment instruments under Section 39.023 for each school year
- 7 and provide the schedule to each school district and
- 8 open-enrollment charter school two years before the school year to
- 9 which the schedule applies. The schedule must provide for the
- 10 administration of an assessment instrument within an assessment
- 11 administration schedule window in the following applicable range:
- 12 (1) for a beginning-of-year assessment instrument,
- 13 between the fourth Monday in August and September 30;
- 14 (2) for a middle-of-year assessment instrument,
- 15 between January 2 and February 21; and
- 16 (3) for an end-of-year assessment instrument, between
- 17 May 1 and May 30, except that the writing portion of an end-of-year
- 18 reading <u>language arts assessment instrument must be administered</u>
- 19 between April 1 and April 15.
- 20 (j) An assessment instrument administered under Section
- 21 39.023 may be administered in multiple parts over more than one day.
- 22 The agency shall adopt procedures to reduce total administration
- 23 time.
- 24 (k) An assessment instrument adopted or developed under
- 25 Section 39.023 must be designed to minimize the impact on student
- 26 instructional time so that:
- 27 (1) for each beginning-of-year or middle-of-year

- 1 assessment instrument separately administered to students in
- 2 grades three and four, 85 percent of students who do not require
- 3 accommodations are expected to complete the assessment instrument
- 4 within 60 minutes;
- 5 (2) for each beginning-of-year or middle-of-year
- 6 assessment instrument separately administered to students in
- 7 grades five through eight, 85 percent of students who do not require
- 8 accommodations are expected to complete the assessment instrument
- 9 within 75 minutes;
- 10 (3) for each end-of-year assessment instrument
- 11 separately administered to students in grades three and four, 85
- 12 percent of students who do not require accommodations are expected
- 13 to complete the assessment instrument within 90 minutes; and
- 14 (4) for each end-of-year assessment instrument
- 15 separately administered to students in grades five through eight,
- 16 <u>85 percent of students who do not require accommodations are</u>
- 17 expected to complete the assessment instrument within 105 minutes.
- 18 (1) The agency shall notify school districts and campuses of
- 19 the results of assessment instruments administered under Section
- 20 39.023 not later than two business days after the date the
- 21 applicable administration schedule window under Subsection (i)
- 22 closes. The results should include a diagnostic report for each
- 23 student and recommendations for use by teachers and parents for
- 24 practical and useful instructional strategies to better meet the
- 25 individual needs of the student based on the student's performance
- 26 on the assessment instrument.
- 27 (m) At least every third year, the agency shall release the

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- questions and answer keys to each end-of-year and end-of-course 1 assessment instrument administered under Section 39.023, excluding 2 any assessment instrument administered to a student for the purpose 3 of retaking the assessment instrument or a question on an 4 assessment instrument that will be reused for other assessment 5 instruments, after the last time the instrument is administered for 6 that school year. To ensure a valid bank of questions for use each 7 8 year, the agency is not required to release a question that is being field-tested and was not used to compute the student's score on the 9 instrument. The agency may defer releasing questions and answer 10 keys as required by this subsection to the extent necessary to 11
- SECTION 1.005. Section 39.0263, Education Code, is amended by adding Subsection (c-1) to read as follows:
