## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to emergency preparedness and safety requirements for
3	youth camps.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 141.009, Health and Safety Code, is
6	amended to read as follows:
7	Sec. 141.009. STANDARDS. The executive commissioner by
8	rule shall establish health and safety standards for youth camps

- 9 The standards may relate to:
- 10 (1) adequate and proper supervision at all times of 11 camp activities;
- 12 (2) qualifications for directors, supervisors, and
- 13 staff and sufficient numbers of those persons;
- 14 (3) proper safeguards for sanitation and public
- 15 health;
- 16 (4) adequate medical services for personal health and
- 17 first aid;
- 18 (5) proper procedures for food preparation, handling,
- 19 and mass feeding;
- 20 (6) healthful and sufficient water supply;
- 21 (7) proper waste disposal;
- 22 (8) proper water safety procedures for swimming pools,
- 23 lakes, and waterways;
- 24 (9) safe boating equipment;

1	(10) proper maintenance and safe use of motor
2	vehicles;
3	(11) safe buildings and physical facilities;
4	(12) proper fire and flood precautions;
5	(13) safe and proper recreational and other equipment;
6	(14) proper regard for density and use of the
7	premises; and
8	(15) records of criminal convictions of camp
9	personnel.
10	SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Health and Safety Code, is amended
11	by adding Section 141.0091 to read as follows:
12	Sec. 141.0091. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND SAFETY
13	REQUIREMENTS. (a) The department may not issue or renew a license
14	for a youth camp under this chapter unless the youth camp operator
15	provides to the department documentation showing the camp:
16	(1) maintains operable radios capable of providing
17	real-time weather alerts issued by the National Weather Service or
18	a similar professional weather service in each camp facility in
19	which the camp provides overnight accommodations;
20	(2) installs and maintains at the camp an emergency
21	warning system that:
22	(A) is capable of alerting all campers and camp
23	occupants of an emergency; and
24	(B) includes a public address system operable
25	without reliance on an Internet connection;
26	(3) monitors safety alerts issued:
27	(A) by the National Weather Service or a similar

1	professional weather service; and
2	(B) by local river authorities or through other
3	<pre>local emergency notification systems;</pre>
4	(4) adopts a written emergency preparedness plan
5	<pre>detailing:</pre>
6	(A) evacuation and transportation procedures;
7	(B) muster zones; and
8	(C) the location and proper use of available
9	<pre>emergency equipment, including:</pre>
10	(i) items for extinguishing fires;
11	(ii) beacons;
12	(iii) flotation devices; and
13	(iv) any other emergency equipment required
14	<pre>by department rules;</pre>
15	(5) provides the emergency preparedness plan
16	described by Subdivision (4) to and obtains approval from the local
17	agency responsible for providing emergency response services for
18	the camp;
19	(6) provides a weekly notification to the local agency
20	described by Subdivision (5) of the number of campers and other
21	occupants present at the camp for that week;
22	(7) designates as an emergency preparedness
23	supervisor a staff member for the camp; and
24	(8) conducts appropriate safety drills during each
25	<pre>camp session.</pre>
26	(b) The executive commissioner shall adopt rules necessary
27	to implement this section.

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- 1 SECTION 3. As soon as possible after the effective date of
- 2 this Act, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
- 3 Services Commission shall adopt rules necessary to implement
- 4 Section 141.009, Health and Safety Code, as amended by this Act, and
- 5 Section 141.0091, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.
- 6 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect on the 91st day after the
- 7 last day of the legislative session.
