A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to disaster preparedness, response, and recovery,
3	including required training for justices of the peace and
4	responding to mass fatality events; requiring a license;
5	authorizing fees.
6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
7	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 27, Government Code, is
8	amended by adding Section 27.0055 to read as follows:
9	Sec. 27.0055. EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTAIN
10	JUSTICES OF THE PEACE. (a) This section applies only to a justice
11	of the peace of a county not served by a medical examiner.
12	(b) The Department of State Health Services, in
13	collaboration with the Texas Division of Emergency Management,
14	shall develop a training program for justices of the peace on
15	managing mass fatality events. The training program must include:
16	(1) decision-making protocols for ordering an
17	autopsy;
18	(2) standards for identifying and documenting bodies;
19	<u>and</u>
20	(3) best practices on:
21	(A) collecting and reporting data regarding
22	missing persons;
23	(B) coordinating efforts with multiple
24	governmental agencies during mass fatality events; and

- 1 (C) providing real-time status updates and
- 2 notifications for close relatives of a victim of a mass fatality
- 3 event.
- 4 (c) For purposes of removal under Chapter 87, Local
- 5 Government Code, "incompetency" in the case of a justice of the
- 6 peace includes the failure of the justice to successfully complete
- 7 within one year after the date the justice is first elected the
- 8 training program developed under this section.
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 411.1236, Government Code, is amended to
- 10 read as follows:
- 11 Sec. 411.1236. ACCESS TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD
- 12 INFORMATION: TEXAS COMMISSION ON FIRE PROTECTION. (a) The Texas
- 13 Commission on Fire Protection is entitled to obtain as provided by
- 14 Subsection (a-1) [from the department] criminal history record
- 15 information [maintained by the department] that relates to a person
- 16 who is:
- 17 (1) an applicant for or holder of a license issued
- 18 under Subchapter M, Chapter 418, or Chapter 419; or
- 19 (2) an applicant for employment by or an employee of
- 20 the commission.
- 21 <u>(a-1) Subject to Sections 411.087 and 418.459 and</u>
- 22 consistent with the public policy of this state, the Texas
- 23 <u>Commission on Fire Protection is entitled to:</u>
- 24 (1) obtain through the Federal Bureau of Investigation
- 25 criminal history record information maintained or indexed by that
- 26 bureau that pertains to an applicant for or holder of a license
- 27 issued under Subchapter M, Chapter 418; and

- 1 (2) obtain from the department or any other criminal
- 2 justice agency in this state criminal history record information
- 3 maintained by the department or that criminal justice agency that
- 4 relates to a person described by Subsection (a).
- 5 (b) The Texas Commission on Fire Protection may not release
- 6 or disclose to any person criminal history record information
- 7 obtained from the Federal Bureau of Investigation under Subsection
- 8 (a-1)(1). Criminal history record information obtained by the
- 9 Texas Commission on Fire Protection under Subsection (a-1)(2) [(a)]
- 10 may not be released to any person or agency except on court order or
- 11 with the consent of the person who is the subject of the criminal
- 12 history record information, or <u>as provided by Subsection (c).</u>
- 13 <u>(c) The Texas Commission on Fire Protection is not</u>
- 14 prohibited from disclosing criminal history record information
- obtained under Subsection (a-1)(2) in a criminal proceeding or in a
- 16 hearing conducted by the commission or by the State Office of
- 17 Administrative Hearings on behalf of the commission [if the
- 18 information is entered into evidence by the board in an
- 19 administrative, civil, or criminal hearing under Chapter 419].
- 20 (d) The Texas Commission on Fire Protection shall destroy
- 21 <u>criminal history record information that is obtained under this</u>
- 22 <u>section after the information is used for its authorized purpose.</u>
- SECTION 3. Subchapter F, Chapter 411, Government Code, is
- 24 amended by adding Section 411.14104 to read as follows:
- Sec. 411.14104. ACCESS TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD
- 26 INFORMATION: TEXAS DIVISION OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT. (a) The
- 27 Texas Division of Emergency Management is entitled to obtain

- 1 criminal history record information as provided by Subsection (b)
- 2 that relates to a person who registers as a volunteer for
- 3 governmental disaster response or recovery operations under
- 4 Subchapter N, Chapter 418.
- 5 (b) Subject to Sections 411.087 and 418.485 and consistent
- 6 with the public policy of this state, the Texas Division of
- 7 Emergency Management is entitled to obtain from the department or
- 8 any other criminal justice agency in this state criminal history
- 9 record information maintained by the department or that criminal
- 10 justice agency that relates to a person described by Subsection
- 11 (a).
- 12 (c) Criminal history record information obtained by the
- 13 Texas Division of Emergency Management under Subsection (b) may not
- 14 be released or disclosed to any person except on court order or as
- 15 provided by Subsection (d).
- 16 (d) The Texas Division of Emergency Management is not
- 17 prohibited from disclosing criminal history record information
- 18 obtained under Subsection (b) in a criminal proceeding.
- 19 (e) The Texas Division of Emergency Management shall
- 20 destroy criminal history record information that is obtained under
- 21 this section after the information is used for its authorized
- 22 purpose.
- SECTION 4. Sections 418.005(a) and (b), Government Code,
- 24 are amended to read as follows:
- 25 (a) This section applies only to:
- 26 (1) an elected law enforcement officer [or county
- 27 judge,] or an appointed public officer of the state or of a

- 1 political subdivision, who has management or supervisory
- 2 responsibilities and:
- 3 (A) whose position description, job duties, or
- 4 assignment includes emergency management responsibilities; or
- 5 (B) who plays a role in emergency preparedness,
- 6 response, or recovery; [and]
- 7 (2) an emergency management coordinator designated
- 8 under Section 418.1015(c);
- 9 (3) a county judge;
- 10 <u>(4)</u> a sheriff; and
- 11 (5) a mayor of a municipality that is not covered by a
- 12 county's hazard mitigation plan [by the emergency management
- 13 director of a county with a population of 500,000 or more].
- 14 (b) Each person described by Subsection (a) shall complete a
- 15 course of training provided or approved by the division of not less
- 16 than 16 [three] hours regarding the responsibilities of state and
- 17 local governments under this chapter every two years. The initial
- 18 course of training must be completed not later than the 180th day
- 19 after the date the person:
- 20 (1) takes the oath of office, if the person is required
- 21 to take an oath of office to assume the person's duties as a public
- 22 officer;
- 23 (2) otherwise assumes responsibilities as a public
- 24 officer, if the person is not required to take an oath of office to
- 25 assume the person's duties; or
- 26 (3) is designated as an emergency management
- 27 coordinator under Section 418.1015(c).

- 1 SECTION 5. Chapter 418, Government Code, is amended by
- 2 adding Subchapters M and N to read as follows:
- 3 SUBCHAPTER M. EMERGENCY MANAGER LICENSES
- 4 Sec. 418.451. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
- 5 (1) "Commission" means the Texas Commission on Fire
- 6 <u>Protection</u>.
- 7 (2) "Emergency manager" means a person who holds an
- 8 emergency manager license under this subchapter.
- 9 (3) "Emergency manager license" means a license issued
- 10 under this subchapter and includes a bridge, basic, intermediate,
- 11 advanced, or master license.
- 12 Sec. 418.452. ADMINISTRATOR; RULES; FEES. (a) The
- 13 commission shall administer and enforce this subchapter.
- 14 (b) The commission may adopt rules to implement this
- 15 subchapter. The division shall adopt rules regarding the minimum
- 16 requirements for each type of license and the minimum requirements
- 17 for the continuing education necessary to renew an emergency
- 18 manager license in order to implement this subchapter.
- 19 (c) The commission may adopt fees reasonable and necessary
- 20 to cover the costs of administering this subchapter.
- Sec. 418.453. DATABASE OF LICENSE HOLDERS. (a) The
- 22 commission, in coordination with the division, shall establish and
- 23 maintain records of each person who holds an emergency manager
- 24 license, including whether the license is valid and whether any
- 25 disciplinary proceeding is pending.
- 26 (b) The commission shall make the records under this section
- 27 available to an emergency management director or the director's

- 1 associated governmental entity on request.
- 2 Sec. 418.454. ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The division may
- 3 establish an advisory committee to provide recommendations on the
- 4 implementation of this subchapter, including on the policies,
- 5 standards, and curriculum adopted under this subchapter.
- 6 (b) If established, the committee consists of nine members
- 7 appointed by the division chief or the chief's designee and must
- 8 contain at least one emergency manager and a representative of a
- 9 governmental entity that employs or is associated with an emergency
- 10 manager.
- 11 (c) Chapter 2110 does not apply to the advisory committee.
- 12 Sec. 418.455. LICENSING REQUIREMENT. A person may not
- 13 serve as an emergency management coordinator under Section
- 14 418.1015(c) for a period that exceeds six months beginning the day
- 15 after the date on which the person was designated as an emergency
- 16 management coordinator, unless the person holds an emergency
- 17 manager license.
- 18 Sec. 418.456. ELIGIBILITY FOR EMERGENCY MANAGER LICENSE;
- 19 ISSUANCE. (a) To be eligible for an emergency manager license, a
- 20 person must:
- 21 (1) submit an application to the commission in a form
- 22 and manner prescribed by the commission;
- 23 (2) demonstrate that the person meets eligibility
- 24 criteria under Section 418.457; and
- 25 (3) not be disqualified based on the person's criminal
- 26 history, as described by Section 418.458.
- 27 (b) The commission shall issue a bridge, basic,

- 1 intermediate, advanced, or master emergency manager license, as
- 2 appropriate, to an applicant who meets the eligibility requirements
- 3 prescribed by Subsection (a).
- 4 Sec. 418.457. EMERGENCY MANAGER LICENSES. (a) To be
- 5 eligible for a bridge emergency manager license, a person must
- 6 complete not less than 40 hours of training and instruction on
- 7 emergency management, which must consist of courses provided or
- 8 approved by division rule.
- 9 (b) The division by rule shall establish the minimum
- 10 eligibility requirements for basic, intermediate, advanced, and
- 11 master emergency manager licenses, including any minimum hours of
- 12 training and instruction or years of experience performing the
- 13 duties of an emergency management coordinator.
- 14 Sec. 418.458. INELIGIBILITY BASED ON CRIMINAL HISTORY. (a)
- 15 A person is not eligible for an emergency manager license if the
- 16 person has been convicted of or placed on deferred adjudication
- 17 community supervision for:
- 18 (1) a felony; or
- 19 (2) any offense that directly relates to the duties
- 20 and responsibilities of an emergency management coordinator, as
- 21 determined by the commission.
- (b) The commission, in consultation with the division, may
- 23 adopt rules specifying offenses, other than those described by
- 24 Subsection (a), a conviction or placement on deferred adjudication
- 25 community supervision for which would disqualify a person as not
- 26 <u>eligible for an emergency manager license.</u>
- Sec. 418.459. AUTHORITY TO CONDUCT CRIMINAL HISTORY CHECK.

- 1 (a) The commission may conduct a criminal history check, including
- 2 a check of any criminal history record information maintained by
- 3 the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in the manner provided by
- 4 Subchapter F, Chapter 411, on each person who applies for an
- 5 emergency manager license.
- 6 (b) For purposes of conducting the criminal history check,
- 7 the commission may require an applicant to submit a complete and
- 8 legible set of fingerprints, on a form prescribed by the
- 9 commission, to the commission or to the department for the purpose
- 10 of obtaining criminal history record information from the
- 11 <u>department and the Federal Bureau of Investigat</u>ion.
- 12 (c) The commission may require the applicant to pay a fee to
- 13 cover any costs associated with conducting a criminal history check
- 14 under this section.
- Sec. 418.460. ALTERNATIVE QUALIFICATIONS. The division by
- 16 rule may allow an applicant for an emergency manager license to
- 17 credit military experience, professional experience, education, or
- 18 another certification toward the eligibility requirements of
- 19 Section 418.457, including an emergency management credential
- 20 issued by another state.
- 21 Sec. 418.461. PROVISION OR APPROVAL OF TRAINING REQUIRED.
- 22 The division shall provide or approve training, instruction, and
- 23 courses sufficient to enable a person to meet the licensing and
- 24 continuing education requirements under this subchapter.
- 25 <u>Sec. 418.462. EXPIRATION; CONTINUING EDUCATION; RENEWAL.</u>
- 26 (a) An emergency manager license expires on the first anniversary
- 27 of the date the license is issued.

- 1 (b) The commission shall renew an emergency manager license
- 2 if an emergency manager:
- 3 (1) completes not less than 16 hours of continuing
- 4 education on emergency management provided or approved by division
- 5 rule; and
- 6 (2) submits an application for renewal to the
- 7 commission on a form and in a manner prescribed by the commission.
- 8 (c) The commission by rule may adopt a system under which
- 9 licenses expire on various dates during the year.
- 10 Sec. 418.463. DENIAL; SUSPENSION; REVOCATION. (a) The
- 11 commission may deny the issuance or renewal of an emergency manager
- 12 license or suspend or revoke an emergency manager license if a
- 13 person violates this subchapter or any rule adopted by the division
- 14 or commission under this subchapter, including being disqualified
- 15 <u>based on the person's criminal history.</u>
- 16 (b) A proceeding under this section is a contested case
- 17 under Chapter 2001.
- 18 SUBCHAPTER N. STATEWIDE VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT SYSTEM
- 19 Sec. 418.481. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
- 20 (1) "Local government" means a municipality, a county,
- 21 <u>a special district or authority</u>, or any other political subdivision
- 22 <u>of this state.</u>
- 23 (2) "Volunteer management system" means the online
- 24 volunteer registration and management database established under
- 25 this subchapter.
- Sec. 418.482. ESTABLISHMENT OF SYSTEM. The division shall
- 27 establish and maintain a statewide volunteer registration and

- 1 management database to register, credential, and manage
- 2 individuals who volunteer to assist in disaster response or
- 3 recovery operations at the direction and under the supervision of a
- 4 state agency or local government.
- 5 Sec. 418.483. SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS. The volunteer
- 6 management system must:
- 7 (1) be made available online;
- 8 (2) be maintained and updated regularly with a roster
- 9 of available volunteers;
- 10 (3) be capable of making and coordinating volunteer
- 11 <u>assignments</u> among state, regional, and local governmental
- 12 entities; and
- 13 (4) document the supervision of volunteers and the
- 14 resources available and necessary to support the volunteers.
- Sec. 418.484. USE OF SYSTEM REQUIRED; LIMITATIONS ON
- 16 REQUIRED REGISTRATION. (a) In this section:
- 17 <u>(1) "Community organization active in disaster" is a</u>
- 18 nonprofit organization that regularly engages in disaster response
- 19 and recovery operations and regularly prepares for those
- 20 operations.
- 21 (2) "Spontaneous volunteer" means an individual who:
- 22 (A) volunteers to assist in disaster response or
- 23 recovery; and
- 24 (B) is not affiliated with voluntary
- 25 organizations active in disaster or any community organization
- 26 active in disaster or with a governmental entity.
- 27 (3) "Voluntary organizations active in disaster" is a

- 1 network of nonprofit organizations that coordinate to provide
- 2 disaster response or recovery services and may include community
- 3 organizations active in disaster.
- 4 (b) The division and each state agency and local government
- 5 that deploys volunteers in disaster response or recovery operations
- 6 shall use the volunteer management system to:
- 7 (1) credential and deploy the volunteers;
- 8 (2) report in the system volunteer activity and
- 9 requests for assistance during periods when a disaster declaration
- 10 is in effect; and
- 11 (3) coordinate volunteer programs by local
- 12 governments to ensure the programs align with state standards and
- 13 requirements.
- 14 (c) Before the division, a state agency, or a local
- 15 government deploys a spontaneous volunteer to assist in disaster
- 16 response or recovery operations, the division, state agency, or
- 17 local government, as applicable, must ensure the spontaneous
- 18 volunteer is registered with the volunteer management system. An
- 19 individual who volunteers and is affiliated with a community
- 20 organization active in disaster or a member or affiliate
- 21 organization of voluntary organizations active in disaster may not
- 22 be required to register with the voluntary management system before
- 23 deployment.
- 24 (d) The division may waive, wholly or partly, any
- 25 requirement of this section as necessary to facilitate an urgent
- 26 response to a disaster.
- Sec. 418.485. AUTHORITY TO CONDUCT CRIMINAL HISTORY CHECK.

- 1 The division may conduct a criminal history check, based on the
- 2 criminal history record information maintained by the department or
- 3 any other criminal justice agency in this state, on each person who
- 4 applies to register as a volunteer under this subchapter.
- 5 Sec. 418.486. INELIGIBILITY TO REGISTER BASED ON CRIMINAL
- 6 HISTORY. The division may adopt rules for the denial of a person's
- 7 application to register in the volunteer management system based on
- 8 the person's criminal history and for purposes of ensuring public
- 9 safety and operational integrity.
- Sec. 418.487. RULES. The division shall adopt rules for
- 11 implementing this subchapter, including:
- 12 (1) registration and renewal requirements for
- 13 volunteer registrations;
- 14 (2) training and credentialing requirements for
- 15 particular disaster response or recovery operations that involve
- 16 <u>specialized training or experience;</u>
- 17 (3) procedures for conducting a criminal history check
- 18 under Section 418.485; and
- 19 (4) protocols for deploying volunteers and reporting
- 20 incidents.
- Sec. 418.488. FUNDS; GIFTS, GRANTS, AND DONATIONS. (a) The
- 22 division may use any available funds to implement this subchapter.
- (b) The division may seek and accept gifts, grants, and
- 24 donations to implement this subchapter.
- Sec. 418.489. AGREEMENTS. The division may enter into an
- 26 agreement with any public or private entity to support volunteer
- 27 <u>mobilization</u> efforts.

- 1 Sec. 418.490. PROPERTY RIGHTS PROTECTED. Nothing in this
- 2 subchapter may be construed as prohibiting a real property owner
- 3 from:
- 4 (1) consenting to allowing a volunteer onto the
- 5 owner's property; or
- 6 (2) accepting assistance from the volunteer.
- 7 SECTION 6. Subtitle A, Title 8, Health and Safety Code, is
- 8 amended by adding Chapter 675 to read as follows:
- 9 CHAPTER 675. MASS FATALITY OPERATIONS
- Sec. 675.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "department"
- 11 means the Department of State Health Services.
- 12 Sec. 675.002. MASS FATALITY OPERATIONS RAPID RESPONSE TEAM.
- 13 (a) The department, in collaboration with the Texas Division of
- 14 Emergency Management, shall establish a mass fatality operations
- 15 rapid response team that immediately on the occurrence of a mass
- 16 fatality event assesses the geographic area where the event
- 17 occurred for the purposes of:
- 18 (1) providing information regarding the mass fatality
- 19 event to public officials and employees who are conducting disaster
- 20 response or recovery operations, including justices of the peace,
- 21 emergency management directors and coordinators, and incident
- 22 commanders; and
- 23 (2) facilitating early and appropriate activation of
- 24 mass fatality management resources.
- 25 (b) The team required by Subsection (a) may be established
- 26 by interlocal contract.
- 27 Sec. 675.003. INTEGRATION OF MASS FATALITY OPERATIONS

- 1 RESPONSE TEAM WITH SEARCH AND RESCUE OR RECOVERY OPERATIONS. Each
- 2 recognized search and rescue organization or recovery team, law
- 3 enforcement agency, fire department, including a volunteer fire
- 4 department, and emergency medical services provider shall
- 5 coordinate the efforts of the entity with the appropriate mass
- 6 fatality operations response team when deploying in response to a
- 7 mass fatality event for the purpose of ensuring coordination during
- 8 the recovery of human bodies and the use of proper documentation,
- 9 including chain-of-custody documentation.
- 10 Sec. 675.004. INTEGRATION OF MASS FATALITY OPERATIONS
- 11 RESPONSE TEAM WITH FAMILY ASSISTANCE CENTERS. (a) In this section,
- 12 "family assistance center" is a facility established by a state
- 13 agency or local government following a mass fatality event to
- 14 coordinate the provision of support services and basic assistance
- 15 to individuals impacted by the mass fatality event, especially
- 16 close relatives of a victim of the event.
- 17 (b) A state agency or local government that establishes a
- 18 family assistance center following a mass fatality event shall
- 19 coordinate efforts to provide services at the center with the
- 20 appropriate mass fatality operations response team.
- Sec. 675.005. MASS FATALITY DATA MANAGEMENT SYSTEM. (a)
- 22 The department shall develop and maintain a centralized fatality
- 23 tracking system for use when deploying a mass fatality operations
- 24 response team.
- 25 (b) The system must be capable of:
- 26 (1) assigning unique case numbers and incident
- 27 tagging;

- 1 (2) tracking the chain-of-custody for a human body and
- 2 associated personal effects; and
- 3 (3) storing in an easily retrievable manner
- 4 documentation of an autopsy and identification and release of a
- 5 <u>human body</u>.
- 6 SECTION 7. A justice of the peace who holds office on the
- 7 effective date of this Act is not subject to removal as described by
- 8 Section 27.0055, Government Code, as added by this Act, for failure
- 9 to successfully complete the required training program until
- 10 December 1, 2026.
- 11 SECTION 8. A person who, on the effective date of this Act,
- 12 is required to complete the training required by Section 418.005,
- 13 Government Code, as amended by this Act, shall complete that
- 14 training not later than the 180th day after the effective date of
- 15 this Act.
- SECTION 9. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this Act,
- 17 this Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of the
- 18 legislative session.
- 19 (b) Section 418.455, Government Code, as added by this Act,
- 20 takes effect January 1, 2027.
