A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the prosecution of certain election offenses.

- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 4 SECTION 1. Article 2A.104, Code of Criminal Procedure, is
- 5 amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (b-1) to
- 6 read as follows:
- 7 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (b-1), if $[\frac{1}{1}]$ an
- 8 attorney representing the state is disqualified to act in any case
- 9 or proceeding, is absent from the county or district, or is
- 10 otherwise unable to perform the duties of the attorney's office, or
- 11 if there is no attorney representing the state, the judge of the
- 12 court in which the attorney represents the state may appoint to
- 13 perform the duties of the attorney's office during the attorney's
- 14 absence or disqualification:
- 15 (1) an attorney representing the state from any county
- 16 or district; or
- 17 (2) an assistant attorney general.
- 18 (b-1) If an attorney representing the state is disqualified
- 19 to act under Article 2A.105(d) or 2A.1051, the judge of the court in
- 20 which the attorney represents the state shall appoint an assistant
- 21 attorney general to perform the duties of the attorney's office
- 22 during the attorney's disqualification. The duties of the
- 23 <u>assistant attorney general appointed under this subsection are</u>
- 24 additional duties of the office of the attorney general, and the

- 1 office of the attorney general is not entitled to additional
- 2 compensation for performing those duties.
- 3 SECTION 2. Article 2A.105, Code of Criminal Procedure, is
- 4 amended by adding Subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 5 (d) A judge of a court in which a district or county attorney
- 6 represents the state shall declare the attorney disqualified for
- 7 purposes of Article 2A.104(b-1) with respect to a criminal case or
- 8 proceeding involving the election laws of this state, on a showing
- 9 that the attorney has adopted a policy or practice, or is following
- 10 or enforcing a policy or practice, under which the attorney
- 11 consistently refuses or declines to prosecute a violation of the
- 12 election laws of this state.
- 13 SECTION 3. Subchapter C, Chapter 2A, Code of Criminal
- 14 Procedure, is amended by adding Article 2A.1051 to read as follows:
- Art. 2A.1051. PETITION TO DISQUALIFY IN CERTAIN CASES. (a)
- 16 A person who has resided in the same county of this state for at
- 17 least six months may file, in any district or county court for that
- 18 county, a petition seeking the disqualification of a district or
- 19 county attorney who serves that county or an adjacent county if:
- 20 (1) the district or county attorney filed a criminal
- 21 case or proceeding involving the election laws of this state in a
- 22 court for the county in which the person resides or for a county
- 23 adjacent to the county in which the person resides; and
- 24 (2) the person has reason to believe the district or
- 25 county attorney has adopted a policy or practice, or is following or
- 26 enforcing a policy or practice, under which the attorney
- 27 consistently refuses or declines to prosecute a violation of the

- 1 <u>election laws of this state.</u>
- 2 (b) The judge of the court in which a petition is filed under
- 3 Subsection (a) shall declare the attorney against whom the petition
- 4 is filed disqualified for purposes of Article 2A.104(b-1) on the
- 5 petitioner showing that the attorney has adopted or is following or
- 6 enforcing a policy or practice described by Subsection (a)(2). If
- 7 the judge disqualifies an attorney under this subsection, the judge
- 8 shall send notice to the judge of the court in which the case
- 9 described by Subsection (a)(1) is pending that the attorney is
- 10 disqualified and an appointment under Article 2A.104(b-1) is
- 11 <u>required.</u>
- 12 (c) Before a charging instrument in a criminal case is
- 13 filed, with respect to a violation of the election laws of this
- 14 state that a person has reason to believe occurred in the county in
- 15 which the person resides, a person described by Subsection (a) may
- 16 <u>file a petition seeking to refer the investigation and prosecution</u>
- 17 of the violation to the office of the attorney general with a court
- 18 described by that subsection in the same manner as if the violation
- 19 had been filed as a case or proceeding described by Subsection
- 20 (a)(1). A judge of a court in which a petition is filed under this
- 21 <u>subsection shall refer the case to the office of the attorney</u>
- 22 general if the petitioner makes the showing required by Subsection
- 23 (b) with respect to the district or county attorney serving the
- 24 petitioner's county of residence.
- 25 SECTION 4. Section 273.021, Election Code, is amended by
- 26 adding Subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 27 (d) In accordance with an appointment made under Article

- 1 2A.104(b-1), Code of Criminal Procedure, the attorney general may
- 2 prosecute a criminal offense prescribed by the election laws of
- 3 this state on the disqualification of a district or county attorney
- 4 under Article 2A.105(d) or 2A.1051, Code of Criminal Procedure, or
- 5 on the referral of the case under Article 2A.1051(c), Code of
- 6 Criminal Procedure.
- 7 SECTION 5. The changes in law made by this Act apply only to
- 8 the prosecution of an offense committed on or after the effective
- 9 date of this Act. The prosecution of an offense committed before
- 10 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on
- 11 the date the offense was committed, and the former law is continued
- 12 in effect for that purpose. For purposes of this section, an
- 13 offense was committed before the effective date of this Act if any
- 14 element of the offense occurred before that date.
- 15 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect on the 91st day after the
- 16 last day of the legislative session.
