CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, In recent months, federal immigration enforcement 2 agents have increasingly worn masks and other attire to conceal their identities while they conduct public-facing enforcement 3 4 actions; and 5 WHEREAS, Without visible badges, names, or insignia, members of the public are unable to confirm whether they are interacting 6 7 with legitimate government officials; this lack of transparency causes confusion and fear while eroding trust in law enforcement, 8 9 which culminates in high-stress situations that endanger both civilians and law enforcement personnel; in addition, when federal 10

agents fail to properly identify themselves, they create obstacles 11

12 to accountability and prevent those who are detained from

challenging unlawful conduct in court; and 13

14 WHEREAS, A number of public officials have voiced concern that allowing federal agents to conceal their identities would 15 16 provide bad actors with more opportunities to impersonate law 17 enforcement personnel and use their anonymity to enact violence; even before the use of masks became commonplace, there was a rise in 18 crimes perpetrated by individuals impersonating law enforcement, 19 including harassment, theft, extortion, assault, battery, sexual 20 assault, and kidnapping; recently, two Minnesota state legislators 21 and their spouses were murdered by an individual who was disguised 22

WHEREAS, Several incidents involving masked and plainclothes

as a police officer; and

No. 19 1 federal agents have created complications for local law enforcement; for example, in June 2025, masked and armed agents 2 3 from U.S. Customs and Border Protection operated a caravan of unmarked vehicles and attempted to enter the parking lots of Dodger 4 5 Stadium in Los Angeles, California; after the agents were denied entry by the stadium's security, police officers were called to the 6 scene and the group of federal agents dispersed; the event sparked a 7 8 wave of speculation and misinformation online, and local officials were left with the burden of finding answers to the onslaught of 9 10 questions from the public; and WHEREAS, Federal immigration enforcement agencies have yet to issue official policies governing the use of masks by agents or provide a clear justification for allowing agents to conceal their

11 12 13 14 identities; however, some members of the U.S. Congress have 15 introduced legislation to remedy those lax uniform policies; the Visible Identification Standards for Immigration-Based 16 17 Enforcement (VISIBLE) Act would require immigration enforcement display clearly visible identification 18 officers to 19 public-facing enforcement actions; the No Secret Police Act would require law enforcement officers and agents of the Department of 20 Homeland Security to clearly display identification and insignia 21 22 when detaining or arresting individuals, and the bill would also ban the officers from using home-made, non-tactical masks; the No 23 24 Anonymity in Immigration Enforcement Act would U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents from wearing 25 26 facial coverings while conducting immigration enforcement operations; and

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1 WHEREAS, In order to maintain the public's trust and foster healthy relationships with the communities they serve, 2 enforcement officers, including federal agents, must prioritize 3 transparency and accountability, and the concealment of their 4 5 identities is antithetical to those values; now, therefore, be it 6 RESOLVED, That the 89th Legislature of the State of Texas, 7 2nd Called Session, hereby respectfully urge the United States 8 Congress to pass legislation requiring federal agents who are to wear proper uniforms and conducting arrests present 9 10 identification and prohibiting agents from wearing facial coverings during public-facing enforcement actions; and, be it 11 further 12 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official 13 14 copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to 15 the president of the Senate and the speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress, and to all the 16 17 members of the Texas delegation to Congress with the request that this resolution be entered in the Congressional Record as a 18

memorial to the Congress of the United States of America.

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
