A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
7	SECTION 1. Section 37.0814(b), Education Code, is amended
8	to read as follows:
9	(b) A security officer described by Subsection (a) must be:

- 10 (1) a school district peace officer;
- 11 (2) a school resource officer; [or]
- 12 (3) a commissioned peace officer employed as security
- 13 personnel under Section 37.081; or
- 14 (4) a canine unit, as defined by Section 108.001,
- 15 Business & Commerce Code.
- SECTION 2. Section 48.115, Education Code, is amended by
- 17 amending Subsections (a) and (b) and adding Subsections (a-2) and
- 18 (a-3) to read as follows:
- 19 (a) Except as provided by Subsection (a-1) and subject to
- 20 Subsection (a-2), a school district is entitled to an annual
- 21 allotment equal to the sum of the following amounts or a greater
- 22 amount provided by appropriation:
- (1) \$100 [$\frac{$10}{}$] for each student in average daily
- 24 attendance, plus \$1 for each student in average daily attendance

- 1 per every \$50 by which the district's maximum basic allotment under
- 2 Section 48.051 exceeds \$6,160, prorated as necessary; and
- 3 (2) $\frac{$100,000}{[$15,000]}$ per campus.
- 4 (a-2) To be eligible to receive an allotment under this
- 5 section, a school district must ensure that:
- 6 (1) at least one security officer described by Section
- 7 37.0814(b) armed with a firearm is present at each district campus
- 8 during regular school hours; and
- 9 (2) at least one school marshal or security officer
- 10 described by Section 37.0814(b) who has received training
- 11 comparable to the training required for a school marshal under
- 12 Section 1701.260(c), Occupations Code, and is armed with a firearm
- 13 is appointed, assigned, or employed by the district for every 200
- 14 students enrolled at the district.
- 15 <u>(a-3)</u> Requirements under subsection (a-2)(2) can also be
- 16 met via at least one remote-human-operated aerial device described
- 17 by Article 2.33(a)(1), Code of Criminal Procedure, deployed or
- 18 contracted by the district at each district campus providing less
- 19 lethal interdiction capability by means of air-based irritant
- 20 delivery or other mechanisms for every 200 students enrolled at the
- 21 <u>district.</u>
- (b) Funds allocated under this section must be used to
- 23 improve school safety and security, including costs associated
- 24 with:
- 25 (1) securing school facilities in accordance with the
- 26 requirements of Section 37.351, including:
- 27 (A) improvements to school infrastructure;

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1 (C) the prevention, identification, management of emergencies and threats, using evidence-based, 2 3 effective prevention practices and including the establishment of 4 5 (i) providing licensed counselors, social workers, chaplains, and individuals trained in restorative 6 7 discipline and restorative justice practices; 8 (ii) providing mental health personnel and support, including chaplains; 9 10 (iii) providing behavioral services, including services provided by chaplains; 11 12 (iv)] threat reporting systems; [and (v) developing and implementing programs 13 focused on restorative justice practices, culturally relevant 14 15 instruction, and providing mental health support, including 16 support provided by chaplains; 17 [(4) providing programs related to suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention, including programs provided by 18 chaplains;] and 19 (4) $[\frac{(5)}{(5)}]$ employing a school safety director and other 20 personnel to manage and monitor school safety initiatives and the 21 implementation of school safety requirements for the district. 22 SECTION 3. Subchapter C, Chapter 48, Education Code, is 23 24 amended by adding Section 48.117 to read as follows: 25 Sec. 48.117. MENTAL HEALTH ALLOTMENT. (a) A school

district is entitled to an annual allotment of \$100,000 or a greater

amount provided by appropriation to support mental health services

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1	at the district.
2	(b) In addition to the allotment under Subsection (a), a
3	school district that receives an allotment under Section 48.101 or
4	at which more than 50 percent of enrolled students are
5	educationally disadvantaged is entitled to an allotment for each
6	student enrolled in the district in an amount provided by
7	appropriation.
8	(c) Funds allocated under this section:
9	(1) must be used to develop or enhance a comprehensive
10	school mental health system that, through the implementation of
11	programs, practices, and procedures in accordance with Section
12	38.351, provides a tiered array of supports and services in the
13	educational setting, including support provided by chaplains, that
14	<pre>contribute to:</pre>
15	(A) a positive school climate;
16	(B) the development of skills related to managing
17	emotions, establishing and maintaining positive relationships, and
18	responsible decision-making;
19	(C) the learning and well-being of students with
20	or at risk of mental health or substance use conditions;
21	(D) family and community engagement;
22	(E) reduced exclusionary discipline practices;
23	<u>and</u>
24	(F) staff wellness; and
25	(2) may be used to pay for costs associated with:
26	(A) the salary of school personnel, including
27	chaplains, responsible for planning, coordinating, delivering, or

- 1 monitoring supports and services described by Subdivision (1);
- 2 (B) training school personnel regarding
- 3 effective practices and district and campus procedures to support
- 4 student mental health;
- 5 (C) a contract-based collaborative effort or
- 6 partnership with one or more local community programs, agencies, or
- 7 providers, including programs provided by chaplains; and
- 8 (D) developing and implementing programs focused
- 9 on restorative justice practices, including programs provided by
- 10 chaplains.
- 11 (d) Funds allocated for purposes of this section may not be
- 12 used to supplant any other funds that may be provided for the same
- 13 purpose.
- 14 (e) Not later than June 1 of each year and in accordance with
- 15 commissioner rule, each school district shall submit to the
- 16 commissioner information regarding the outcomes and expenditures
- 17 related to funds allocated to the district under this section.
- 18 (f) Not later than September 1 of each year, the
- 19 commissioner shall publish a report regarding the use of funds
- 20 allocated under this section during the preceding school year,
- 21 including information regarding the programs, personnel, and
- 22 <u>resources implemented</u>, employed, or <u>pur</u>chased by school districts
- 23 using the funds and other purposes for which the funds were used.
- SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
