A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to the development of a state information technology 3 apprenticeship credential offered by public junior colleges or 4 public technical institutes to address shortages in the state 5 information resources workforce.

SECTION 1. Subchapter C, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is
amended by adding Section 2054.0702 to read as follows:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

9 <u>Sec. 2054.0702. STATE</u> INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY 10 <u>APPRENTICESHIP CREDENTIAL.</u> (a) In this section, "public junior 11 <u>college" and "public technical institute" have the meanings</u> 12 <u>assigned by Section 61.003, Education Code.</u>

13 (b) A state agency may enter into an agreement with a public 14 junior college district under Section 130.0081, Education Code, or 15 a public technical institute under Section 135.06, Education Code, 16 or other applicable law to offer a program leading to a state 17 information technology apprenticeship credential to address 18 shortages in the state information resources workforce.

(c) A program offered under this section must:

20 <u>(1) be approved by the Texas Higher Education</u> 21 <u>Coordinating Board in accordance with Section 61.0512, Education</u> 22 <u>Code;</u>

23 (2) develop the knowledge and skills necessary for a 24 journey- or senior-level information technology position in a state

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1	agency; and
2	(3) include a one-year apprenticeship with:
3	(A) a relevant state agency;
4	(B) an organization working on a major
5	information resources project; or
6	(C) a regional network security center
7	established under Section 2059.202.
8	(d) An apprenticeship described by Subsection (c)(3) may
9	be:
10	(1) an apprenticeship program registered with the
11	United States Department of Labor; or
12	(2) an industry-recognized apprenticeship program
13	offered by a public junior college or public technical institute
14	that:
15	(A) adheres to academic and workforce standards
16	required by industry; and
17	(B) provides for flexibility in course design and
18	implementation, including flexibility regarding the:
19	(i) number of hours of classroom
20	instruction and on-the-job training required;
21	(ii) competencies required for
22	credentialing; and
23	(iii) goals for the program, as determined
24	by the employer partner and faculty of the institution.
25	(e) The executive director shall update the department's
26	intra-agency career ladder program to ensure that an associate
27	degree together with a credential awarded under this section may be

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1	substituted for a four-year baccalaureate degree.
2	(f) The classification officer in the office of the state
3	auditor shall review the state's position classification plan to
4	determine whether an associate degree together with a credential
5	awarded under this section may be substituted for a four-year
6	baccalaureate degree and revise relevant job descriptions
7	accordingly.
8	(g) If a program offered under this section is not fully
9	funded through tuition and other money available to the public
10	junior college district or public technical institute for that
11	purpose, a state agency may:
12	(1) use any money available to the agency for the
13	purpose of offering the program; and
14	(2) solicit and accept gifts, grants, and donations
15	from any public or private source for the purpose of offering the
16	program.
17	SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2025.

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
