H.B. No. 3174

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to county and hospital district disease control pilot
- 3 programs to reduce the risk of certain infectious and communicable
- 4 diseases; authorizing fees.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. This Act may be cited as the Honorable Ruth Jones
- 7 McClendon Act.
- 8 SECTION 2. (a) The legislature finds drug abuse has been a
- 9 tragedy for many Texas families, and for individuals addicted to
- 10 drugs the receipt of education about and treatment for addiction is
- 11 imperative. Cooperation with community-based and faith-based
- 12 organizations creates a network of support for Texas families and
- 13 the opportunity to intervene in drug addiction. Members of
- 14 community-based and faith-based organizations have a strong desire
- 15 to compassionately preserve lives and help those stricken with
- 16 disease and drug addiction.
- 17 (b) Allowing the operation of disease control pilot
- 18 programs will reduce the transmission of blood-borne diseases,
- 19 including HIV/AIDS, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C, and provide
- 20 program participants with referrals to appropriate health and
- 21 social services. A pilot program established under this Act may
- 22 provide necessary access to primary health care, ensure safe and
- 23 sterile disposal of used syringes and needles, and protect the
- 24 public health. Pilot program goals may include reduced rates of

- 1 intravenous drug use and a reduced number of injuries to innocent
- 2 victims, first responders, and law enforcement caused by needle
- 3 sticks from improperly disposed needles. Additionally, it is the
- 4 intent of the legislature for a pilot program to increase access to
- 5 substance abuse treatment services, increase the likelihood of
- 6 successful treatments for addiction, and protect the public health
- 7 and safety.
- 8 SECTION 3. Section 526.0056, Government Code, as effective
- 9 April 1, 2025, is amended to read as follows:
- 10 Sec. 526.0056. PILOT PROGRAM TO PREVENT SPREAD OF
- 11 INFECTIOUS $\underline{\text{AND}}$ [$\underline{\text{OR}}$] COMMUNICABLE DISEASES. The commission may
- 12 provide guidance to the counties and hospital districts in those
- 13 counties that establish [local health authority of Bexar County in
- 14 establishing] a disease control pilot program under Subchapter K,
- 15 Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, [funded by the county] to
- 16 prevent the spread of HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, and other
- 17 infectious and communicable diseases. The program may include a
- 18 disease control outreach program that provides for the anonymous
- 19 exchange of used hypodermic needles and syringes.
- SECTION 4. Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, is amended by
- 21 adding Subchapter K to read as follows:
- 22 SUBCHAPTER K. PILOT PROGRAM TO REDUCE RISK OF CERTAIN INFECTIOUS
- AND COMMUNICABLE DISEASES
- Sec. 81.501. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. This subchapter
- 25 applies only to Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Harris, Nueces, Travis, and
- 26 Webb Counties and hospital districts in those counties.
- Sec. 81.502. DISEASE CONTROL PILOT PROGRAM. (a) A county

- 1 or hospital district may establish a disease control pilot program
- 2 under this subchapter to prevent the spread of infectious and
- 3 communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C.
- 4 The pilot program may include disease control outreach programs
- 5 that:
- 6 (1) provide for the anonymous exchange of used
- 7 hypodermic needles and syringes for an equal number of new
- 8 hypodermic needles and syringes;
- 9 (2) offer education on the transmission and prevention
- 10 of infectious and communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis
- 11 B, and hepatitis C; and
- 12 (3) assist program participants in obtaining health
- 13 care and other physical and mental health-related services,
- 14 <u>including substance abuse treatment services and blood-borne</u>
- 15 disease testing.
- 16 (b) A county or hospital district may register an
- 17 organization to operate the disease control pilot program and
- 18 distribute hypodermic needles and syringes to control the spread of
- 19 certain blood-borne communicable diseases. The county or hospital
- 20 district may charge the organization a registration fee in an
- 21 amount reasonable and necessary to cover the costs of registration
- 22 oversight, including coordination with law enforcement personnel.
- 23 <u>(c) A registered organization may charge a program</u>
- 24 participant a fee for each hypodermic needle or syringe used in the
- 25 program not to exceed 150 percent of the actual cost to the
- 26 organization of the hypodermic needle or syringe.
- 27 (d) A registered organization shall annually provide to the

- 1 department and the county or hospital district with which the
- 2 organization is registered information on:
- 3 (1) the effectiveness of the disease control pilot
- 4 program;
- 5 (2) the program's impact on reducing the spread of
- 6 infectious and communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis B,
- 7 and hepatitis C; and
- 8 (3) the program's effect on injected drug use by
- 9 individuals residing within the county or hospital district.
- 10 Sec. 81.503. DISTRIBUTION OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES TO PILOT
- 11 PROGRAM. A person licensed as a wholesale drug distributor or
- 12 device distributor under Chapter 431 may distribute hypodermic
- 13 needles and syringes to a disease control pilot program authorized
- 14 by this subchapter.
- 15 Sec. 81.504. HANDLING OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES. An
- organization registered as provided by Section 81.502:
- 17 (1) shall store hypodermic needles and syringes in a
- 18 proper and secure manner and allow only authorized employees or
- 19 volunteers of the organization's disease control pilot program to
- 20 access the hypodermic needles and syringes;
- 21 (2) may include hypodermic needles and syringes in
- 22 packaged safe kits made available to program participants through
- 23 the program;
- 24 (3) may provide hypodermic needles, syringes, and safe
- 25 kits to program participants only through an authorized employee or
- 26 volunteer of the program; and
- 27 (4) shall store and dispose of used hypodermic needles

- 1 and syringes in accordance with applicable state laws and
- 2 administrative rules governing the safe and proper disposal of
- 3 medical waste.
- 4 Sec. 81.505. FUNDING. Except to the extent specifically
- 5 prohibited by law, an organization registered to operate a disease
- 6 control pilot program as provided by Section 81.502 may solicit or
- 7 accept gifts, grants, or donations to fund the program.
- 8 Sec. 81.506. EXPIRATION. This subchapter expires September
- 9 1, 2035.
- 10 SECTION 5. Section 481.125, Health and Safety Code, is
- 11 amended by adding Subsections (j), (k), (l), and (m) to read as
- 12 follows:
- (j) Subsections (a) and (b) do not apply to a person who
- 14 possesses or delivers a hypodermic needle or syringe for a medical
- 15 purpose. For the purposes of this subsection, "medical purpose"
- 16 <u>includes the exchange of a hypodermic needle or syringe for a used</u>
- 17 hypodermic needle or syringe in a disease control pilot program
- 18 described by Subchapter K, Chapter 81.
- 19 (k) Subsections (a) and (b) do not apply to a person who
- 20 possesses or manufactures hypodermic needles or syringes for
- 21 <u>delivery to a disease control pilot program described by Subchapter</u>
- 22 K, Chapter 81.
- 23 (1) Subsections (a) and (b) do not apply to a person who is
- 24 an employee, volunteer, duly authorized agent, or program
- 25 participant of a disease control pilot program described by
- 26 Subchapter K, Chapter 81, and uses, possesses, or delivers a
- 27 hypodermic needle or syringe as part of the program.

- 1 (m) This subsection and Subsections (j), (k), and (l) expire
- 2 <u>September 1, 2035.</u>
- 3 SECTION 6. The change to Section 481.125, Health and Safety
- 4 Code, made by this Act applies only to an offense committed on or
- 5 after the effective date of this Act. An offense committed before
- 6 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect when
- 7 the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect
- 8 for that purpose. For purposes of this section, an offense is
- 9 committed before the effective date of this Act if any element of
- 10 the offense occurs before the effective date.
- 11 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
