1 SECTION 5. As soon as practicable after the effective date 2 of this Act, the members of the Collaborative Task Force on Public 3 School Mental Health Services shall draw lots to determine which 4 members serve a term expiring September 1, 2026, which members 5 serve a term expiring September 1, 2027, and which members serve a 6 term expiring September 1, 2028. The lots must be split into thirds 7 or as near to thirds as possible.

8 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 9 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 10 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 11 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 12 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
