## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to reading instruction, assessment instruments, and
3	interventions provided to public school students.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 28.006, Education Code, is amended by
6	amending Subsections (a), (b), (c-1), (c-3), (d), and (j) and
7	adding Subsections (a-1), (b-2), (g-3), (g-4), (g-5), and (g-6) to
8	read as follows:
9	(a) The commissioner shall <u>adopt procedures</u> [ <del>develop</del>
10	recommendations] for school districts and open-enrollment charter
11	<pre>schools for:</pre>
12	(1) administering reading instruments to:
13	(A) ensure the validity and reliability of the
14	results of the reading instruments;

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- (B) diagnose student reading development and 15
- comprehension; and 16
- 17 (C) identify students at risk for dyslexia or
- other reading difficulties; 18
- 19 (2) training educators in administering the reading
- 20 instruments; and
- 21 applying the results of the reading instruments to
- 22 the instructional program and intervention practices.
- 23 (a-1) A school district or open-enrollment charter school
- may not administer a reading instrument to a student more than three 24

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1 times during a school year.
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- 2 The commissioner shall adopt a list of (b) 3 instruments that a school district or open-enrollment charter school shall [may] use to diagnose student reading development and 4 5 comprehension for students in kindergarten through grade three. The reading instrument must include the foundational literacy 6 7 components of phonemic and phonological awareness, phonics, 8 vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension. For use in diagnosing the reading development and comprehension of kindergarten students, 9 10 the commissioner shall adopt a multidimensional assessment tool that includes a reading instrument and tests at least three 11 12 developmental skills, including foundational literacy components. A multidimensional assessment tool administered as provided by this 13 14 subsection is considered to be a reading instrument for purposes of [A district-level committee established under 15 this section. Subchapter F, Chapter 11, may adopt a list of reading instruments 16 17 for use in the district in a grade level other than kindergarten in addition to the reading instruments on the commissioner's list. 18 19 Each reading instrument adopted by the commissioner [or a
- 20 district-level committee] must:
- 21 <u>(1)</u> be based on scientific research concerning reading 22 skills development and reading comprehension;
- (2) [. A list of reading instruments adopted under this subsection must] provide for diagnosing the reading development and comprehension of students participating in a program under Subchapter B, Chapter 29;
  - (3) provide progress monitoring capabilities;

- 1 (4) provide a diagnostic tool to assist teachers in
- 2 developing research-based targeted instruction;
- 3 (5) allow screening of students three times a year;
- 4 (6) assess only the foundational literacy components
- 5 not already mastered by a student; and
- 6 (7) determine if a student needs reading instruction
- 7 intervention.
- 8 (b-2) In adopting a reading instrument under this section,
- 9 the commissioner shall prioritize selecting an instrument that:
- 10 (1) minimizes the impact of administration of the
- 11 instrument on instructional time;
- 12 (2) provides timely reporting of results; and
- 13 (3) is able to be integrated into reading instruction.
- 14 (c-1) Each school district shall administer at the
- 15 beginning of the seventh grade a reading instrument adopted by the
- 16 commissioner to each student whose performance on the assessment
- 17 instrument in reading administered under Section 39.023(a) to the
- 18 student in grade six did not demonstrate reading proficiency, as
- 19 determined by the commissioner. The district shall administer the
- 20 reading instrument in accordance with the commissioner's
- 21 recommendations for administering reading instruments that
- 22 diagnose student reading development and comprehension [under
- 23 Subsection (a)(1)].
- 24 (c-3) The commissioner by rule shall determine the
- 25 performance on each applicable [the] reading instrument adopted
- 26 under Subsection (b) that indicates kindergarten readiness.
- 27 (d) The superintendent of each school district or the person

- who serves the function of superintendent in each open-enrollment 1 charter school shall: 2 report [to the commissioner and the board of 3 trustees of the district] the results of the reading instruments 4 5 to: 6 the board of trustees of a school district; (A) 7 or 8 (B) the governing body of an open-enrollment charter school, as defined by Section 12.1012(3); 9 10 (2) not later than the 30th [60th] calendar day after the date on which a reading instrument was administered report, in 11 12 writing, to a student's parent or guardian the student's results on the instrument and any additional information required by the 13
- 15 (3) report to the agency any information required by
  16 the agency, including the results of the reading instrument and
  17 [using the school readiness certification system provided to the
  18 school district in accordance with Section 29.161(e), report
  19 electronically] each student's raw score on the reading instrument
  20 [to the agency for use in the school readiness certification
  21 system].

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agency; and

21 <u>(g-3)</u> A school district or open-enrollment charter school
23 <u>shall provide reading intervention to each student in kindergarten</u>
24 <u>through grade three who is determined to need reading intervention</u>
25 <u>using an assessment administered in accordance with Subsection (b).</u>
26 <u>The school district shall continue to offer a student reading</u>
27 <u>intervention until the student achieves satisfactory performance</u>

- 1 on a reading instrument. A reading intervention program offered
- 2 under this subsection must:
- 3 (1) include targeted instruction to improve the
- 4 student's reading skills in the relevant areas identified through
- 5 the assessment instrument;
- 6 (2) monitor the progress of the student's reading
- 7 skills throughout the school year;
- 8 <u>(3) be implemented during regular school hours and in</u>
- 9 addition to core instruction;
- 10 (4) use high-quality instructional materials,
- 11 curricula, and curricular tools that are research based and
- 12 effective for early childhood literacy intervention; and
- 13 (5) be provided by a teacher who has attended a
- 14 literacy achievement academy provided under Section 21.4552.
- 15 <u>(g-4)</u> In providing reading intervention under Subsection
- 16 (g-3), a school district or open-enrollment charter school may not
- 17 remove a student, except under circumstances for which a student
- 18 enrolled in the same grade level who is not receiving reading
- 19 intervention would be removed, from:
- 20 (1) instruction in the foundation curriculum and
- 21 enrichment curriculum adopted under Section 28.002 for the grade
- 22 level in which the student is enrolled; or
- 23 (2) recess or other physical activity that is
- 24 available to other students enrolled in the same grade level.
- 25 (g-5) In addition to the report required under Subsection
- 26 (d)(2), a school district or open-enrollment charter school shall
- 27 notify the parent or guardian of each student in kindergarten

- 1 through grade three who is determined to need reading intervention.
- 2 The notification must:
- 3 (1) be distributed not later than the 30th day after
- 4 the date the result of the reading instrument indicating that the
- 5 student needs intervention is available;
- 6 (2) describe the current reading services the district
- 7 or school provides to the student;
- 8 <u>(3) describe the reading interventions that will be</u>
- 9 provided to the student to ensure the student will meet or exceed
- 10 grade-level reading standards; and
- 11 (4) include high-quality resources for the parent or
- 12 guardian of the student to use at home to help the student succeed
- 13 at reading.
- 14 (q-6) From money appropriated for the purpose, the
- 15 commissioner may provide literacy coaching and technical
- 16 <u>assistance to kindergarten through grade three classroom teachers</u>,
- 17 or to individuals serving in that role, to implement this section.
- 18 The commissioner shall prioritize providing technical assistance
- 19 under this subsection in school districts with the highest rate of
- 20 students performing below satisfactory levels on reading
- 21 instruments administered under Subsection (b).
- (j) [No more than 15 percent of the funds certified by the
- 23 commissioner under Subsection (i) may be spent on indirect costs.
- 24 The commissioner shall evaluate the programs that fail to meet the
- 25 standard of performance under Section 39.301(c)(5) and may
- 26 implement interventions or sanctions under Chapter 39A. [The
- 27 commissioner may audit the expenditures of funds appropriated for

- 1 purposes of this section. The use of the funds appropriated for
- 2 purposes of this section shall be verified as part of the district
- 3 audit under Section 44.008.
- 4 SECTION 2. Subchapter A, Chapter 28, Education Code, is
- 5 amended by adding Section 28.0063 to read as follows:
- 6 Sec. 28.0063. PRIVATE READING INSTRUCTION FOR CERTAIN
- 7 STUDENTS. (a) A school district or open-enrollment charter school
- 8 shall contract with and make available a private, third-party
- 9 tutoring service to address a student's reading deficiency. The
- 10 district or school must make the service available to a parent or
- 11 guardian of a student who is determined to need reading
- 12 intervention using an assessment administered under Section 28.006
- 13 on each of the reading assessments administered for two consecutive
- 14 school years. The cost to a district or school for contracting for
- 15 tutoring service under this subsection may not exceed \$1,000 per
- 16 student.
- 17 (b) A parent or guardian of a student described by
- 18 Subsection (a) may select a tutoring service not provided by the
- 19 school district or open-enrollment charter school to address the
- 20 student's reading deficiency. The district or school shall
- 21 contract directly with that service to pay the lesser of the cost of
- 22 the service or \$1,000 to provide tutoring services to the student.
- 23 The district or school may not provide money under this subsection
- 24 directly to a parent or guardian of a student.
- 25 (c) A school district or open-enrollment charter school
- 26 that provides a tutoring service to a student under this section
- 27 shall continue to provide the student any other reading support

- 1 required of the district or school.
- 2 (d) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to
- 3 implement this section.
- 4 SECTION 3. Section 29.1543, Education Code, is amended to
- 5 read as follows:
- 6 Sec. 29.1543. EARLY EDUCATION REPORTS. The agency shall
- 7 produce and make available to the public on the agency's Internet
- 8 website annual district and campus-level reports containing
- 9 information from the previous school year on early education in
- 10 school districts and open-enrollment charter schools. A report
- 11 under this section must contain:
- 12 (1) the information required by Section 29.1532(c) to
- 13 be reported through the Public Education Information Management
- 14 System (PEIMS);
- 15 (2) a description of <u>any</u> [the] diagnostic reading
- 16 instruments administered as provided by Section 28.006 [in
- 17 accordance with Section 28.006(c) or (c-2)];
- 18 (3) the number of students who were administered a
- 19 diagnostic reading instrument administered as provided by Section
- 20 28.006 [in accordance with Section 28.006(c) or (c-2)];
- 21 (4) the number of students whose scores from a
- 22 diagnostic reading instrument administered <u>as provided by Section</u>
- 23  $\underline{28.006}$  [in accordance with Section  $\underline{28.006(c)}$  or  $\underline{(c-2)}$ ] indicate
- 24 reading proficiency;
- 25 (5) the number of kindergarten students who were
- 26 enrolled in a prekindergarten program in the previous school year
- 27 in the same district or school as the district or school in which

- 1 the student attends kindergarten;
- 2 (6) the number and percentage of students who perform
- 3 satisfactorily on the third grade reading or mathematics assessment
- 4 instrument administered under Section 39.023, disaggregated by
- 5 whether the student was eligible for free prekindergarten under
- 6 Section 29.153;
- 7 (7) the number of students described by Subdivision
- 8 (6) who attended kindergarten in the district, disaggregated by:
- 9 (A) whether the student met the kindergarten
- 10 readiness standard on  $\underline{a}$  [the] reading instrument adopted under
- 11 Section 28.006;
- 12 (B) whether the student attended prekindergarten
- 13 in the district; and
- 14 (C) the type of prekindergarten the student
- 15 attended, if applicable; and
- 16 (8) the information described by Subdivisions (6) and
- 17 (7) disaggregated by whether the student is educationally
- 18 disadvantaged.
- 19 SECTION 4. Sections 28.006(c), (c-2), (i), and (k),
- 20 Education Code, are repealed.
- 21 SECTION 5. This Act applies beginning with the 2025-2026
- 22 school year.
- 23 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 24 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 25 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 26 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 27 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
