1 AN ACT 2 relating to the Joint Admission Medical Program Council. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 51.822, Education Code, is amended to 4 5 read as follows: Sec. 51.822. JOINT ADMISSION MEDICAL PROGRAM. The Joint 6 7 Admission Medical Program is a program administered by the Joint Admission Medical Program Council to: 8 (1) provide services, including mentoring, academic 9 support, and counseling and relief, to support and encourage highly 10 qualified, economically disadvantaged students pursuing a medical 11 12 education to complete a medical degree and meet state workforce 13 needs; 14 (2) award undergraduate and graduate scholarships and summer stipends to those students; [and] 15 16 (3) guarantee and facilitate the admission of those 17 students to at least one participating medical school, subject to the conditions under Section 51.827 and under other provisions of 18 19 this subchapter; 20 (4) align statewide educational and workforce goals to 21 increase medical jobs and stop workforce shortages; and 22 (5) promote the accessibility and equality of medical 23 education by addressing statewide barriers to entry and participation for economically disadvantaged communities. 24

3 Sec. 51.823. COMPOSITION OF COUNCIL. (a) The 4 participating medical schools shall jointly establish the Joint 5 Admission Medical Program Council<u>. The council shall consist</u> 6 [consisting] of one faculty member employed by and representing 7 each of the participating medical schools.

8 (c) The council shall select one of its members to serve as 9 council chair for a term of two years. <u>The chair shall:</u>

Section 51.834, Education Code, is amended by 5 amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as 6 follows: 7 (b) The report must contain detailed information regarding: 8 (1)any problems the council identifies in program, implementing the including external or internal 9 challenges, deficiencies, or obstacles, with recommended solutions 10 for those problems, including recommendations for legislative 11 12 action to streamline and enhance the implementation of the program; (2) an accounting of all [the expenditure of any] 13 14 money received under this subchapter, including: 15 (A) legislative appropriations and private funding sources; 16 17 (B) breakdowns of disbursements; (C) the specific purposes for which money was 18 19 used; and (D) a statement of the ending balance and any 20 unobligated and unexpended money remaining for the state fiscal 21 22 year; [and] the total number of students who are admitted to 23 (3) 24 the program; (4) the number of students who are admitted to the 25 26 program and who are enrolled in each year of a baccalaureate, graduate, or professional degree program offered by: 27

unobligated money to medical school scholarship recipients, 1 2 including institutional policies; and (D) a plan for applying or reallocating 3 unobligated money in a manner that ensures accountability and 4 5 sustainability; 6 (8) an estimate of the total amount of program funding 7 required for the next state fiscal biennium to maintain enrollment 8 and operations and increase the graduate scholarship amount for medical school scholarship recipients, including requirements 9 under Section 51.824, including: 10 11 (A) projections based on current and anticipated 12 scholarship demands; (B) recommendations for appropriations 13 14 specifying the additional money needed; and 15 (C) a formal request or petition for supplemental funding to ensure the program's financial stability and capacity to 16 17 meet future demands; (9) the amount of gifts, grants, and donations 18 19 received under Section 51.833; and (10) any notes, agendas, minutes, and reports made in 20 regard to council meetings, including: 21 22 (A) the dates, times, and locations of all 23 council meetings; 24 (B) measures to ensure that students participating in the program are informed of upcoming council 25 26 meetings in a timely and accessible manner, including through direct communication; 27

20	program to submit anonymous or identified recommendations and
21	complaints regarding the program. The portal must:

23	anonymously, using encryption and other privacy safeguards to
24	protect the identity of the student making the submission;
25	(2) be accessible through different platforms,

No. 5154 1 encourage participation and ease of use. 2 (b) The council shall review complaints or recommendations 3 submitted through the online portal on a regular basis to identify potential areas for improvement. 4 5 (c) A complaint or recommendation submitted through the online portal must be: 6 7 (1) shared with the Texas Medical and Dental Schools 8 Application Service and other relevant stakeholders, as authorized by law; and 9 10 (2) compiled into a report to be: (A) included in the council's report under 11 12 Section 51.834; 13 (B) posted on the council's Internet website; and 14 (C) submitted to participating students and the 15 standing legislative committees with primary jurisdiction over 16 higher education. (d) The council shall establish procedures to ensure that 17 complaints and recommendations submitted through the online portal 18 19 are addressed in a timely and transparent manner, including by 20 developing: 21 (1) a tracking system to monitor the resolution of 22 complaints and recommendations; 23 (2) a mechanism to categorize submissions by topic and 24 urgency to prioritize responses effectively; and 25 (3) a process for notifying a student of actions taken 26 in response to the student's complaint or recommendation, excluding 27 information that would violate a student's expectation of privacy.

<u>(e) The council shall promote the online portal to</u>
 <u>participating students, including by providing information during</u>
 <u>student orientation, via e-mail, and through the program's Internet</u>
 <u>website.</u>
 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives

a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
