## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The State of Texas and Mexico have greatly benefited

from their strong economic relationship and long history of

3 bilateral trade; and

WHEREAS, Fresh tomatoes imported from Mexico contribute more

5 than \$7.5 billion to the U.S. economy and support nearly 50,000

6 jobs; more than half of the imported tomatoes enter through ports in

7 Pharr and Laredo, with an estimated value of nearly \$1.5 billion;

9 WHEREAS, The Suspension Agreement on Fresh Tomatoes from

10 Mexico, or the Tomato Suspension Agreement, is the result of a

11 collaborative effort involving the U.S. Department of Commerce and

12 nearly 700 producers and exporters of fresh tomatoes grown in

13 Mexico; the agreement first became effective on November 1, 1996,

14 and its most recent update went into effect on September 19, 2019;

15 and

16 WHEREAS, Under the Tomato Suspension Agreement, signatory

17 producers and exporters must sell Mexican tomatoes at or above a

18 specific reference price to eliminate the injurious effects of

19 exports of fresh tomatoes to the United States; the agreement has

20 helped to bring stability to the tomato market while complying with

21 U.S. trade laws, and it has established strong enforcement and

22 monitoring mechanisms; in addition, the agreement ensures that U.S.

23 consumers have access to a wide selection of fresh tomatoes

24 year-round; and

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- WHEREAS, The termination of the Tomato Suspension Agreement 1 would subject U.S. companies to a 17.09 percent tariff on each 2 3 shipment of tomatoes imported from Mexico, resulting in severe economic harm to numerous businesses and communities in Texas; the 4 estimated potential loss to the state's economy is more than 5 \$4.5 billion and 32,000 jobs; the vast majority of produce 6 warehouses in the Rio Grande Valley would see immediate and severe 7 reductions in their business, and many would face the threat of 8 closure; moreover, high duties on tomatoes would negatively impact 9 10 consumers by inflating prices and limiting the supply of vine-ripened and specialty tomatoes, which are predominantly 11 12 imported by Texas companies; and
- WHEREAS, Countless businesses, residents, workers, and citizens of Texas have benefited from the Tomato Suspension Agreement, and its continuation is vital to the economy of the Lone Star State; now, therefore, be it
- 17 RESOLVED, That the 89th Legislature of the State of Texas 18 hereby respectfully urge the U.S. Department of Commerce to 19 maintain the Tomato Suspension Agreement; and, be it further
- 20 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward an 21 official copy of this resolution to the U.S. Secretary of Commerce.
