HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The city of Fort Worth has evolved into a prominent 2 center for the aviation and defense sectors, attracting major corporations, manufacturing facilities, and a skilled workforce 3 that continues to drive innovation and economic growth in these 4 5 industries; and 6 WHEREAS, Fort Worth's connection to the military dates to its 7 establishment as a frontier outpost in 1849; later, as the United States mobilized for World War I, the city served as the home of 8 Camp Bowie, which trained 100,000 soldiers in the U.S. Army's 36th 9

10 Infantry Division; during World War II, the construction of the

B-24 and B-32 bombers in Fort Worth and the development of Carswell

12 Air Force Base solidified the city's longstanding partnership with

13 the U.S. armed forces, which continues to this day; and

WHEREAS, Beginning in the 1970s, Fort Worth became 14 manufacturing location for the F-16, one of the world's most widely 15 used fighter jets; today, the city remains at the forefront of 16 aerospace innovation as the assembly site of the F-35 Lightning II, 17 the most advanced fifth-generation fighter jet in the world, which 18 is produced by Fort Worth-based Lockheed Martin Aeronautics; in 19 20 March 2025, it was announced that the global F-35 fleet had 21 surpassed one million total flight hours; and

WHEREAS, In 1951, Bell Textron, Inc., opened in Fort Worth
the first factory in the world specifically designed to manufacture

24 helicopters, and in 2018, the location was designated a Vertical

- 1 Flight Heritage Site by the Vertical Flight Society; the company
- 2 has produced and delivered more than 35,000 Bell rotorcraft, and it
- 3 is slated to expand its Fort Worth operations by opening a new
- 4 advanced manufacturing facility for the U.S. Army's Future Long
- 5 Range Assault Aircraft; this state-of-the-art tiltrotor is
- 6 designed to fly two times farther and faster than the current fleet;
- 7 and
- 8 WHEREAS, Since 1974, Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport
- 9 has served Fort Worth, the North Texas region, and the State of
- 10 Texas as a gateway to destinations around the globe; it has grown
- 11 into one of the busiest airports in the world and welcomes more than
- 12 86 million travelers a year and generates over \$37 billion in annual
- 13 economic impact; and
- 14 WHEREAS, American Airlines relocated its corporate
- 15 headquarters to Fort Worth in 1979, and the carrier now maintains a
- 16 workforce of more than 36,000 in North Texas and operates thousands
- 17 of flights per day to more than 350 destinations in over 60
- 18 countries; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Fort Worth has played an integral part in advancing
- 20 America's leadership in military capability and aerospace
- 21 technology, and these contributions have brought profound benefits
- 22 to our state and nation; now, therefore, be it
- 23 RESOLVED, That the 89th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 24 hereby designate Fort Worth as the official Aviation and Defense
- 25 Capital of Texas; and, be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That, in accordance with the provisions of Section
- 27 391.003(e), Government Code, this designation remain in effect
