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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

| 5  | BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:             |
| 6  | SECTION 1. Section 28.002, Education Code, is amended by            |
| 7  | adding Subsections (h-11) and (h-12) to read as follows:            |
| 8  | (h-11) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills for           |
| 9  | the social studies curriculum for each grade level from grade 4     |
| 10 | through grade 12, the State Board of Education shall, as            |
| 11 | appropriate, adopt essential knowledge and skills that develop each |
| 12 | student's understanding of communist regimes and ideologies and     |
| 13 | include age appropriate and developmentally appropriate             |
| 14 | instruction with information on:                                    |
| 15 | (1) the history of and tactics used by communist                    |
| 16 | movements in the United States;                                     |
| 17 | (2) historical events and atrocities attributable to                |
| 18 | communist regimes, including:                                       |
| 19 | (A) the Cultural Revolution and the Great Leap                      |
| 20 | Forward;  |
| 21 | (B) the Holodomor, otherwise known as the                           |
| 22 | <u>Ukrainian Famine;</u>  |
| 23 | (C) the Soviet-era political purge known as the                     |
| 24 | Great Terror;   |

No. 24 1 (D) the Cambodian genocide under Pol Pot and the 2 Khmer Rouge; 3 (E) the origins and policies of the Communist 4 Party of Cuba; 5 (F) communist guerrilla movements in Latin 6 America; and 7 (G) the oppression and suffering experienced by people living under communist regimes, including mass murder, 8 9 violent land seizures, show trials, concentration camps, forced labor, poverty, and general economic deterioration; 10 11 (3) a comparative analysis of: (A) the ideologies of communism 12 and 13 totalitarianism contrasted with the United States' founding principles of freedom and democracy; and 14 15 (B) collectivist ideologies contrasted with the 16 United States' founding principles of individual rights, merit-based advancement, and free enterprise; 17 18 (4) modern threats to the United States and its allies posed by communist regimes and ideologies; 19 (5) common economic, industrial, and political events 20 that historically precede communist revolutions; 21 22 (6) the evolution of communist ideologies from 23 economic, class-based theories into broader cultural movements that divide societies and maintain collective control over 24 25 individual rights; (7) common historical and modern methods used to 26 27 spread communist ideologies, including:

| (h-12) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills   |
| required under Subsection (h-11), the State Board of Education:   |
| (1) shall adopt and publish standards for the required  |
| instruction;  |

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1 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 2 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 3 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 4 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 5 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
