A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the inclusion of an understanding of communist regimes
3	and ideologies in the essential knowledge and skills for the social
4	studies curriculum for certain public school students.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Section 28.002, Education Code, is amended by
7	adding Subsections (h-11) and (h-12) to read as follows:
8	(h-11) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills for
9	the social studies curriculum for each grade level from grade 4
10	through grade 12, the State Board of Education shall, as
11	appropriate, adopt essential knowledge and skills that develop each
12	student's understanding of communist regimes and ideologies and
13	include age appropriate and developmentally appropriate
14	<pre>instruction with information on:</pre>
15	(1) the history of and tactics used by communist
16	movements in the United States;
17	(2) historical events and atrocities attributable to
18	<pre>communist regimes, including:</pre>
19	(A) the Cultural Revolution and the Great Leap
20	Forward;
21	(B) the Holodomor, otherwise known as the
22	<u>Ukrainian Famine;</u>
23	(C) the Soviet-era political purge known as the
24	Great Terror;

1	(D) the Cambodian genocide under Pol Pot and the
2	Khmer Rouge;
3	(E) the origins and policies of the Communist
4	Party of Cuba;
5	(F) communist guerrilla movements in Latin
6	America; and
7	(G) the oppression and suffering experienced by
8	people living under communist regimes, including mass murder
9	violent land seizures, show trials, concentration camps, force
10	labor, poverty, and general economic deterioration;
11	(3) a comparative analysis of:
12	(A) the ideologies of communism and
13	totalitarianism contrasted with the United States' founding
14	principles of freedom and democracy; and
15	(B) collectivist ideologies contrasted with the
16	United States' founding principles of individual rights
17	merit-based advancement, and free enterprise;
18	(4) modern threats to the United States and its allies
19	<pre>posed by communist regimes and ideologies;</pre>
20	(5) common economic, industrial, and political events
21	that historically precede communist revolutions;
22	(6) the evolution of communist ideologies from
23	economic, class-based theories into broader cultural movements
24	that divide societies and maintain collective control over
25	individual rights;
26	(7) common historical and modern methods used to

spread communist ideologies, including:

1	(A) propaganda;
2	(B) public shaming tactics;
3	(C) censorship; and
4	(D) forced conformity; and
5	(8) first-person accounts, in the form of in-person,
6	video-recorded, or written testimony, from the victims of communist
7	regimes.
8	(h-12) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills
9	required under Subsection (h-11), the State Board of Education:
10	(1) shall adopt and publish standards for the required
11	<pre>instruction;</pre>
12	(2) shall seek input from:
13	(A) victims of communism willing to share their
14	<pre>first-person accounts; and</pre>
15	(B) nationally recognized organizations
16	dedicated to commemorating victims of communism; and
17	(3) may incorporate material from existing
18	educational programs that provide instruction on the topic of
19	communist regimes and ideologies, if the material meets the
20	standards adopted by the State Board of Education under Subdivision
21	<u>(1).</u>
22	SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2026-2027
23	school year.
24	SECTION 3. Not later than July 31, 2026, the State Board of
25	Education shall review and revise, as needed, the essential
26	knowledge and skills of the social studies curriculum as required
27	by Section 28.002(h-11), Education Code, as added by this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
