A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1-21 1-22 AN ACT

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relating to the inclusion of an understanding of communist regimes and ideologies in the essential knowledge and skills for the social studies curriculum for certain public school students.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 28.002, Education Code, is amended by adding Subsections (h-11) and (h-12) to read as follows:

(h-11) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills for social studies curriculum for each grade level from grade 4 through grade 12, the State Board of Education shall, as appropriate, adopt essential knowledge and skills that develop each student's understanding of communist regimes and ideologies and developmentally appropriate and age instruction with information on:

the history of and tactics used by communist in the United States; movements

(2) historical events and atrocities attributable to communist regimes, including:

(A) the Cultural Revolution and the Great Leap

Forward; Holodomor, otherwise known (B) the as the Ukrainian Famine;

(C) the Soviet-era political purge known as the

(h-12) In adopting the essential knowledge and sk required under Subsection (h-11), the State Board of Education:

(1) shall adopt and publish standards for the required instruction;

shall seek input from:

(A) victims of communism willing to share their first-person accounts; and

(B) nationally recognized organizations dedicated to commemorating victims of communism; and

(3) may incorporate from material existing educational programs that provide instruction the on topic of if the material meets the communist regimes and ideologies, standards adopted by the State Board of Education under Subdivision

SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2026-2027 school year.

SECTION 3. Not later than July 31, 2026, the State Board of Education shall review and revise, as needed, the essential knowledge and skills of the social studies curriculum as required

by Section 28.002(h-11), Education Code, as added by this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2025.

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
