## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 25.087, Education Code, is amended by adding Subsection (b-9) and amending Subsection (d) to read as follows:

8 (b-9) A school district shall excuse a student from
9 attending school for a maximum of 10 days in a school year for an
10 absence resulting from symptoms related to a menstrual disorder,
11 such as dysmenorrhea, endometriosis, menorrhagia, or polycystic
12 ovary syndrome, if the student or the student's parent or guardian
13 provides documentation from a physician licensed to practice
14 medicine in this state stating that the student has a menstrual
15 disorder.

14 15 16 (d) A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b), (b-1), (b-2), (b-4), (b-5), (b-7), (b-8), (b-9), or (c) may not be 17 penalized for that absence and shall be counted as if the student 18 attended school for purposes of calculating the average daily 19 attendance of students in the school district. A student whose 20 21 absence is excused under Subsection (b), (b-1), (b-2), (b-4), (b-5), (b-7), (b-8), (b-9), or (c) shall be allowed a reasonable 22 23 time to make up school work missed on those days. If the student satisfactorily completes the school work, the day of absence shall 24

- 1 be counted as a day of compulsory attendance.
- 2 SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2025-2026
- 3 school year.
- 4 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 5 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 6 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 7 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 8 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
