A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the liability of a funeral service provider for mental
3	anguish damages.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Title 4, Civil Practice and Remedies Code, is
6	amended by adding Chapter 77A to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 77A. FUNERAL SERVICE PROVIDERS
8	Sec. 77A.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
9	(1) "Body or remains" means a human corpse or the body
10	parts of a human corpse.
11	(2) "Claimant" means a person described by Section
12	77A.002(a) who brings an action described by that section.
13	(3) "Funeral service" means a service performed by a
14	funeral service provider related to the care, preparation, and
15	disposition of a body or remains, including:
16	(A) retrieving, loading, and transporting the
17	body or remains;
18	(B) storing, embalming, dressing, casketing,
19	interring, or cremating the body or remains;
20	(C) arranging, supervising, and conducting a
21	<pre>funeral ceremony; and</pre>
22	(D) arranging, supervising, and implementing the
23	final disposition of the body or remains.
24	(4) "Funeral service provider" means a person engaged

- 1 in the business of providing funeral services. The term includes an
- 2 employee or contractor of the person engaged in the business of
- 3 providing funeral services, including an employee or contractor
- 4 used in the provision of a funeral service and who is:
- 5 (A) an embalmer;
- 6 (B) a crematory operator;
- 7 (C) a funeral director;
- 8 (D) a provisional license holder; or
- 9 (E) a transporter.
- Sec. 77A.002. APPLICABILITY; EXCLUSIVE REMEDY. (a) This
- 11 chapter applies only to an action:
- 12 (1) brought by a person who has a special relationship
- 13 with a funeral service provider due to a claimant's right of
- 14 sepulcher, a right to possess a body or remains, a right to control
- 15 the disposition of a body or remains under Section 711.002(a),
- 16 Health and Safety Code, or another related right; and
- 17 (2) in which the person seeks to recover mental
- 18 anguish damages from a funeral service provider based on that
- 19 special relationship.
- 20 (b) A claimant may not pursue an action governed by this
- 21 chapter under any other law to obtain mental anguish damages from a
- 22 <u>funeral service provider.</u>
- 23 Sec. 77A.003. LIMITED LIABILITY FOR MENTAL ANGUISH DAMAGES.
- 24 (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b), a funeral service
- 25 provider is not liable to a claimant for mental anguish damages
- 26 unless the claimant proves:
- 27 (1) the funeral service provider mishandled a body or

- 1 remains;
- 2 (2) if the funeral service provider had acted in a
- 3 manner consistent with the common practice of reasonably prudent
- 4 funeral service providers, the mishandling of the body or remains
- 5 would not have occurred;
- 6 (3) as a result of the mishandling of the body or
- 7 remains and the close personal relationship between the claimant
- 8 and the decedent, the claimant experienced grievous or debilitating
- 9 angst, distress, torment, emotional suffering, or turmoil that
- 10 caused a substantial disruption in the claimant's daily routine;
- 11 and
- 12 (4) a reasonable person in the position of the funeral
- 13 service provider would have foreseen that the mishandling of the
- 14 body or remains would cause significant emotional harm to the
- 15 claimant.
- 16 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (c), mental anguish
- 17 damages that may be recovered from a funeral service provider by a
- 18 claimant in an action governed by this chapter are limited to the
- 19 lesser of:
- 20 (1) three times the amount paid to the funeral service
- 21 provider for funeral services for the decedent; or
- 22 <u>(2) \$50,000.</u>
- 23 <u>(c) A claimant may not recover mental anguish damages from a</u>
- 24 funeral service provider in an action governed by this chapter if
- 25 the claimant seeks relief from the funeral service provider under
- 26 Subchapter E, Chapter 17, Business & Commerce Code.
- Sec. 77A.004. <u>JURY INSTRUCTIONS</u>. <u>In a trial to a jury for</u>

- 1 an action governed by this chapter, the court shall provide the jury
- 2 a definition for mental anguish that conforms to Section
- 3 77A.003(a)(3) and instruct the jury regarding the requirements of
- 4 this chapter.
- 5 Sec. 77A.005. CONSTRUCTION OF CHAPTER. This chapter does
- 6 <u>not:</u>
- 7 (1) create a cause of action in favor of, or confer
- 8 standing to bring an action against a funeral service provider on,
- 9 any person; or
- 10 (2) limit a claimant's recovery of other forms of
- 11 economic or exemplary damages or apply to other actions, including
- 12 actions to recover damages for death or physical injury caused to
- 13 the claimant by negligence of a funeral service provider.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 77A, Civil Practice and Remedies Code,
- 15 as added by this Act, is an exercise of authority under Section
- 16 66(c), Article III, Texas Constitution, and takes effect only if
- 17 this Act receives a vote of three-fifths of all the members elected
- 18 to each house, as provided by Subsection (e) of that section.
- 19 SECTION 3. Chapter 77A, Civil Practice and Remedies Code,
- 20 as added by this Act, applies only to an action commenced on or
- 21 after the effective date of this Act. An action commenced before
- 22 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law applicable to
- 23 the action immediately before the effective date of this Act, and
- 24 that law is continued in effect for that purpose.
- 25 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 26 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 27 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this

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- 1 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 2 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
