Subchapter A, Chapter 131, Agriculture Code, is 1-22 1-23 amended by adding Section 131.011 to read as follows: 131.011. TASK FORCE ON POLLINATOR HEALTH. (a) In this Sec. "task force" means the task force on pollinator health 1-24 secti<u>on,</u> under this section. The governor shall establish the task force and 1-25 1-26 the membership of the task force. 1-27 The task force consists of members appointed by the (b) 1-28 including: governor, 1-29 (1) one member who is a university faculty member 1-30 specializing in the science of pollinator health; 1-31 (2) one member representing an advocacy for group greenhouse producers; 1-32 nurseries and (3<u>)</u> 1-33 one member representing an advocacy group for 1-34 agriculture in this state; 1-35 (4)one member representing an advocacy group 1-36 dedicated to the protection of pollinators and invertebrates; 1-37 one member representing an advocacy group (5) for 1-38 pesticide applicators; 1-39 one member who is certified as a master gardener by (6) the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and who represents the 1-40 1-41 public; 1-42 (7)one member who is a beekeeper and who represents 1-43 the public; and 1 - 44(8) one member who is an employee of the Parks and 1-45 Wildlife Department who specializes in melittology. ( <u>c</u> ) 1-46 The task force shall undertake activities to examine issues relevant to pollinator health, including: (1) identifying ways the state can 1-47 1-48 incentivize the 1-49 development of new pollinator habitat in residential, commercial, 1-50 and public areas; (2) studying public education and outreach pollinator health that have been successful in 1-51 plans 1-52 regarding other 1-53 states; 1-54 (3)investigating the means used by other states to 1-55 gather data on populations of bees or other pollinating insects; 1-56 and 1-57 (4) identifying ways to prevent loss of pollinator 1-58 habitat (d) 1-59 The task force may take actions necessary and proper to 1-60 carry out the work of the task force, including scheduling hearings and taking testimony on matters related to pollinator health. 1-61

2-3	(f) Official action by the task force requires the approval
2-4	of a majority of the members of the task force.
2-5	(g) The task force shall elect one of its members to serve as

2-7	(h) The governor shall appoint a qualified person to fill a
2-8	vacancy on the task force.
2-9	(i) The task force shall meet at times and places specified
2-10	by the call of the presiding officer or of a majority of the members
2-11	of the task force.
2-12	(j) The task force may adopt bylaws necessary for the

2-14	(k) Not later than October 1, 2026, the task force shall
2-15	submit a report, which may include recommendations for legislation,

2-19	<u>October 1, 2026.</u>
2-20	(1) The governor may provide staff support to the task

2-23	compensation but may be reimbursed for actual and necessary travel
2-24	and other expenses incurred in the performance of their official

2-27	(n) Each state agency shall assist the task force in the
2-28	performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws
2-29	relating to confidentiality, shall furnish information and advice

2-31 2-32	(o) A member of the task force may participate remotely in a
2-33	meeting of the task force by means of a video conference call or
2-33	online service.
2-35	(p) This section expires December 31, 2026.
2-36	SECTION 2. Not later than October 1, 2025, the governor
2-37	shall appoint the members of the task force on pollinator health
2-38	under Section 131.011(b), Agriculture Code, as added by this Act.
2-39	SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
2-40	a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
2-41	provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
2-42	Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
2-43	Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
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
