Thank you for your service and this opportunity. I am a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and a former Child Protective Services Specialist. I have a graduate degree from the University of Texas at Austin and am a former Child Welfare Scholar at the School of Social Work. I regularly assess for child safety in homes as a part of my job and safe weapon storage is a part of this assessment. Many of the children in the child welfare system are at danger of self harm and easy access to a firearm is a huge risk to these children. Please allow the child welfare agencies in charge of keeping our Texas children safe to properly assess weapon risk in these home. They are trained to determine risk (to others, as well as themselves) and ensure that weapons, including knives, are kept safely, especially when kids are at risk of self-harm. These jobs are very challenging and protecting children in high risk environments is extremely stressful. Please do not make this important job more difficult, or impossible, to successfully perform. The stakes are life and death for these children.
