I am an old pediatrician who has experienced the positive impact of childhood vaccines on these now vaccine preventable diseases. It is very important that vaccine rates stay high in the population for the vaccines to be optimally effective. None of the vaccines are 100 % effective and depending upon how contagious an individual infecting virus or bacteria is the percentage of the population required to be vaccinated varies. Measles and pertussis are the most infectious (contagious) and thus are the first illnesses to emerge as the percentage of children vaccinated drops. There is great evidence of the effectiveness of these vaccines. The risk of serious vaccine adverse events is very low-actually less than the risk of being struck by lightning, but not zero but the benefit far exceeds the risk. I tell families that they had greater risk of being involved in a serious motor vehicle accident while driving to my office than the risk of the vaccine. We make benefit:risk analyses daily. Making it easier to obtain exemption will lower vaccination rates and soon other now vaccine preventable diseases will emerge. Please do not make it easier to obtain vaccine exemption. I would love to have the opportunity to address committee if possible but please consider my concerns.

This bill is a common-sense measure that would provide relief to families burdened by a process that is currently lengthy, intrusive, and confusing.

First, the current process is lengthy. Right now, once a parent submits a request online, it can take up to 10 days just to receive the necessary forms in the mail. Even worse, the confirmation screen that pops up after submitting a request admits requests may not be processed at all due to frequent technical issues.

The process is also unnecessarily intrusive. Parents must submit their own name, email address, and phone number, their child's full name, date of birth, and mailing address. That data is retained electronically—even if not actively tracked. This bill would ensure that families can access their legal rights without handing over excessive personal information.

The system is also confusing. TFVC regularly receives pleas from Texas families needing help just to navigate the exemption process. We even created a dedicated webpage to explain all the ins and out of Texas exemption laws. That shouldn't be necessary for something this simple.

As a result, children are missing school. For example:

- *A family who moves to Texas mid-school year cannot request an affidavit form until they have a Texas mailing address and cannot enroll their children in school while waiting to have their affidavit request processed and forms mailed.
- *When students transfer schools, affidavits frequently don't follow, forcing parents to start the request process again, but in the meantime their children are excluded from school.
- *Numerous parents have reported to TFVC that the technical issues that DSHS warns about are quite real. They request the form multiple times and never receive it in time, leaving their children out of class.

These are real stories from Texas families—and there are many more like them. All of these absences are avoidable with a more efficient system.

To be clear: this bill does not change who qualifies for exemptions. It simply ensures parents can access their legal rights without unnecessary barriers. Texans are not required to prove their deeply held beliefs for other medical procedures. The current process adds needless hurdles that exclude children from school. Please vote YES on this simple, streamlined solution.

An Open Letter to the Texas Legislature Regarding House Bill 1586: Implications for Public Health Reporting and Disease Prevention in Texas

As a Master's-prepared Chief Nurse overseeing a large urban clinical immunization program, I write to express deep concern over House Bill 1586, which seeks to restrict public health data collection, reporting, or access related to immunizations and infectious disease surveillance without explicit individual consent.

This bill would severely hinder Texas' ability to monitor, prevent, and respond to communicable diseases, undermining decades of work in evidence-based public health practice.

Public Health Surveillance Saves Lives

Modern disease surveillance systems, including immunization registries like ImmTrac2, are crucial tools for detecting outbreaks, identifying coverage gaps, and deploying resources efficiently. Without timely, complete, and accessible data:

- Preventable disease outbreaks could go undetected until they spiral out of control.
- Immunization efforts could be fragmented, duplicative, or inefficient.
- Vulnerable populations—such as immunocompromised individuals, infants, and the elderly—could be left exposed.

Public health relies on aggregate, de-identified data to inform decisions—not to infringe on privacy but to protect the health of our communities.

HB 1586 Undermines Disease Prevention and Trust

If passed, HB 1586 would:

- Weaken local and state ability to respond to outbreaks by limiting access to immunization and health status data.
- Create unnecessary administrative burdens that divert staff from direct care and prevention.
- Compromise routine vaccine delivery by undermining ImmTrac2, which helps providers identify patients due for immunizations.
- Fuel mistrust by legitimizing misinformation around vaccine safety, public health tracking, and governmental overreach—when in fact, Texas already has strong privacy protections in place.

By conflating public health surveillance with individual surveillance, HB 1586 misrepresents the nature and intent of these essential systems.

I want to start by thanking Children's Health Defense, who, by their relationships with the families and members of the

Mennonite community in Texas where the two young girls died, both obtained the medical records and then asked me to serve as an expert reviewer.

Both of the girls died in an ICU of end-stage lung failure. As a pulmonary and critical care specialist who has researched and managed lung failure for my entire career, I believe I am highly qualified to serve as the expert reviewer for these cases. At the beginning of any expert report for a malpractice case, the first pages are a lengthy recitation of the reviewer's credentials to make the case that they are qualified to serve as an "expert." Their CV is also attached as an Exhibit. I will spare you that part in this post, but I have made them available here if you are interested (Exhibit A).

When I was drafting this expert summary report of my detailed review of the medical records of these now-dead children, I tried to aim for a sober, objective, unemotional, and professional approach to be read (and likely heavily "critiqued") by some of the wider public. I believe I largely achieved that, with some exceptions. However, I added extensive "rolling" commentary for the layperson because this is Substack and not a report meant for a court case.

Before I start, I want all to know that the parents of both children are from the same community and know each other. They and the community are obviously in grief over these unnecessary and easily preventable deaths, which you will learn more about why below. I will state at the outset that, in my professional opinion, neither child died of measles. Not even close.

CASE #1 - Kaley Fehr, Age 6

I will only briefly discuss Kaley's case because it was already covered extensively in an interview I did with CHD TV a little over two weeks ago. Plus, the record and findings are straightforward.

Kaley was a six-year-old previously healthy girl who contracted measles along with her four siblings (all of whom weathered the illness just fine under the care of Dr. Ben Edwards). As her rash was clearing, she began to develop signs and symptoms of "secondary bacterial pneumonia," a not uncommon complication of almost any viral infection. To wit, one of my three daughters fell ill with the same after she contracted influenza at age 14; however, in her case, she recovered from it two days after receiving an appropriate antibiotic.

In Kaley's case, her worsening respiratory status led her parents to bring her to Providence Covenant Children's Hospital. Please read the rest of the report here.

This expiration on exemption forms should not be allowed. It is burdensome and unnecessary for families to have to repeat their request to renew their exemption. We are in the middle of a measles outbreak, the largest in Texas in the last 30 years. As of April 25, we have recorded 646 cases, 2 fatalities, 64 hospitalizations and now spread in 26 counties (Texas Tribune article: https://www.texastribune.org/series/texas-measles-outbreak/).

The outbreak started in Gaines County, which has a vaccination rate of 82%. According to the CDC, vaccination rates need to stay above 95% to ensure herd immunity (https://www.cdc.gov/ncird/whats-new/measles-outbreak-risk-in-us.html#:~:text=What%20CDC%20knows,risk%20for%20a%20measles%20outbreak.)

On the surface, the idea of reducing administrative burden for both the Department of State Health Services and parents requesting exemptions may seem reasonable. However, I am deeply concerned about the unintended consequences. Making the exemption process easier risks significantly increasing exemption rates — not necessarily among those with deep convictions not to vaccinate, but among parents who find it easier to file an exemption than to take the time to schedule a doctor's appointment, take time off work, and ensure their child is vaccinated.

We must have guardrails in place to ensure that obtaining an exemption is not easier than completing the vaccination process itself.

Vaccination rates are declining — not just in the communities where I reside, but across Texas. In the current outbreak, we have seen infants, too young to be vaccinated, contract measles after being exposed in daycare centers by children whose parents chose not to vaccinate. Texas PTA is aligned with National PTA's position on vaccines, which encourages State Education Agencies to require certification of immunizations to prevent communicable diseases as a condition of entry into public and nonpublic schools, preschools, and child care facilities. National PTA recognizes the need for limited exemptions for medical and religious reasons, but also emphasizes the importance of maintaining high vaccination rates to protect all children.

This bill would significantly weaken the current conscientious exemption process by removing the requirement to request the affidavit from DSHS and eliminating form security features. Many children cannot receive vaccines for medical reasons and depend on herd immunity to stay safe. Loosening exemption procedures would further jeopardize the health and safety of vulnerable students.
