As a profession, Roofing is in desperate need of licensing. My background is Architecture and I've been in the field of Roofing for the last 17 years. There have been countless numbers of projects that we have been on that previous "roofers" have been doing damage to the roofs that they were supposedly repairing. The two notable mistakes involved the misapplication of asphalt mastic. On one project, the improper EPDM repair on a non-profit's building, the mastic repair turned a several hundred dollar repair into a \$50,000 re-roof.

The second mastic mishap involved a shopping center that had mastic being applied in a way that was masking damage to the totaled roof that they were supposedly shopping center owner could have filed an insurance claim. The roof repair tech didn't recognize that he was acting against the financial interests of the property owner. The repairs were short lived and after we got involved, we recognized what had been done and was able to work with the Owner's insurance company to get the \$640,000 roof covered by his insurance.

The third example involved an unlicensed and untrained roofing company that didn't pull a permit or involve a licensed electrician to disconnect night lighting for the parking lot from the parapet walls during construction. The roofer loose laid the night lights on the roof and then left for the day. Unfortunately they left the power connected and the night lights were on a timer switch. The lights turned on overnight and started a fire that burned approximately 1/3 of the building. Luckily the lease space below the fire was unoccupied at the time. If it had been a tenant such as a night club or restaurant, it could have resulted in loss of life and not just property damage.

By requiring the trade of Roofing to have a professional license, the financial interests and safety of the public will be better protected.

However, if a property has contents, families, employees, etc. Then a license should be required. Just like admitted carriers and non admitted (surlplus) lines insurance restoration contractors whether they are GC's or roofers. As a side note, roofers will find a way to reinvent themselves as a GC to get around any "roofing" bill. On another note, the abusive practices of insurance appraisal is beyond out of control among contractors, attorneys, and the good ol boy network. In my opinion, appraisal should be abolished or statues need to be put in place. There are consumer protection laws for bad faith claims handling, licensed public adjusters, and attorneys to help policyholders. We live in a credential seeking society. I am glad this bill is being discussed. I have worked as an independent adjuster for different insurance carriers for several years before owning and operating my roofing business. I learned the roofing trade from my father in Corpus Christi, Texas. Inland I.

One of the reasons I started my roofing business is because of what I saw during my time as an IA after large hail events. Out of town roofing companies, brand new companies with no work history, contractors asking for large sums of money as deposits, NOT pulling permits. No regulation.

You need a license issued by the State of Texas to work as an adjuster. As the adjuster you look at and report on the condition of the roof after the storm along with providing estimate of repairs. As the adjuster you are not removing anything or installing anything. The roofer that does remove and install roofing systems you do not need a license from the State of Texas. That part made no sense to me. Roofs protect your assets and your family. Electricians get licensed, plumbers get licensed, HVAC technicians get licensed or at least certified. Why shouldn't roofers?

Because Texas has no licensing requirements for roofers. I am registered with the City of San Antonio as a general contractor. Recently the City of San Antonio requires contractors to pass the ICC Residential Building Contractor Certification (Exam ID G13). I passed it. HB 3344 creates the requirements for roofing contractors to be licensed, a commission to administer the rules of roofing contractor licensing – including the investigating and resolving of complaints, background checks, penalties, and other checks against deceptive behavior by bad actors.

These reforms are essential to protect consumers. A licensed contractor is more likely to follow safety codes, building regulations, and ethical business practices. If anything goes wrong—like faulty work, damage, or unfinished jobs—homeowners have standards under which to seek some recourse.

HB 3344 prohibits a roofing contractor from offering to pay or rebate all or part of insurance deductibles, which helps to reduce insurance fraud. Bad actors, often seeking to exploit people who have suffered significant losses caused by fire, flood, or hurricanes, are known to inflate the invoice to the insurance company to make up the difference of deductible coverage. That misrepresentation is insurance fraud, plain and simple, and increases the costs of insurance over time for everyone.

HB 3344 rightly includes the requirements that to receive a license an applicant must pass an examination adopted by the Department. (The Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation) It is important the roofing contractors pass exams demonstrating knowledge of applicable building codes, proper roofing techniques, and safety standards to ensure that they consistently provide quality work for homeowners.

An added benefit of roofing contractor licensing is that licensed contractors typically carry liability insurance and workers' compensation. This protects both the homeowner and the workers in case of injury or property damage. An unlicensed contractor might not be insured, which could leave the homeowner financially responsible if something goes wrong.

This bill will protect well established and reputable roofing contractors. Legitimate roofing contractors who follow the rules and provide quality work are at a competitive disadvantage when irreputable contractors, cut corners in quality, or fail to perform the work promised. How can this protect consumers when you are proposing to exempt homebuilders from having a license, when buying a home is one of the largest purchases a consumer would ever make in their life? While it is important to have an appropriate knowledge of roofing when reroofing, ensuring the roof is done correctly, should also be done at the time the structure is initially built. Exempting new construction while targeting repair work is nonsensical - a leaky roof damages a home whether it's six months or twenty years old. You propose for a general contractor to sit on the board overseeing this license, when they themselves are not required to have a license? This is the height of hypocrisy and creates dangerous accountability gaps. The arbitrary 10-year experience requirement is an outrageous barrier to entry designed to protect established contractors at the expense of skilled workers trying to enter the field. As a roofing company owner, if I die, how can I pass down my legacy to my children if they themselves do not have 10 years of experience? As old timers age out of this business, how are we to entice and attract young entrepreneurial minded ones to the roofing business?
