This bill is a fundamental violation of constitutional rights of free speech, free movement, and the right to healthcare. It would make it illegal to travel out of state to another state to engage in an activity that is legal in the destination state. It would be unconstitutional to forbid Texans from traveling to Nevada to engage in casino gambling, including jail terms and large fines. This would basically convert us into a totalitarian, authoritarian state, somewhat like the one in the novel 1984. Women would be living in a prison if they were in Texas. This type of bill has already been struck down by a federal judge in Alabama, and submitting it again is simply a waste of taxpayers' resources on lawyer fees.

Lilith Fund, Texas' oldest abortion fund, has been helping Texans pay for their legal abortion care for almost 25 years. Our clients are Texans, primarily low-income women of color, who want to make their reproductive decisions a reality but do not have the funds to do so.

The total abortion ban, in effect since 2022, has made it more difficult than ever for Texans to access abortion care, and as expected it has cost many pregnant Texans their future fertility, their health, and their lives. There is no denying that abortion bans are cruel and deadly.

HB 5510 would only make the situation worse for pregnant Texans by isolating them and threatening their support systems. It creates civil liability for manufacturing, mailing, transporting, distributing, delivering, prescribing, or providing medication abortion within the state or to a Texan, even when a Texan had a medication abortion entirely outside of the state. This means that medical providers, loved ones, and support networks following the laws of their state could face legal risk simply for helping a Texan access medication abortion in a state where it is legal. Attempts to expand Texas laws beyond our state borders creates a de-facto travel ban for Texans seeking abortion care and sets a dangerous precedent. Additionally, if successful, the components of the law that threaten the manufacturing and distribution of medication abortion could disrupt nationwide access to medications that are vital for abortion, miscarriage management, and labor.

The bill inappropriately expands the Attorney General's power to enforce state abortion laws through civil action. Worse, it explicitly lists the dangerous pre-Roe abortion ban under the definition of the abortion crime laws that the Attorney General will have authority to enforce. This could wrongfully give the Attorney General the power to sue pregnant Texans and the people who help them access abortion care. Any risk of pregnant Texans being prosecuted is too high.

It is clear that this bill seeks to isolate pregnant Texans and to eliminate every lifeline they have to safely access medication abortion care. This would fall the hardest on low-income Texans who rely on a network of support within Texas and outside of the state to access the healthcare they need. No matter who they are or how much they make, pregnant Texans deserve access to healthcare without the government interfering. We urge the committee to vote against HB 5510.

It would also make it a felony, punishable by up to life in prison, to pay or reimburse the costs of an abortion, a direct hit on abortion funds. This private enforcement mechanism increases the risk of harassing or politically motivated lawsuits and encourages bounty-style litigation against individuals or organizations who may have supported a Texan seeking medication abortion.

This bill allows abusive partners to sue when they disagree with a person's abortion decision and allows them to publicize their private medical information.

The wrongful death statute specifically excluded any cause of action based on an abortion, this bill reverses that policy which has been in effect since 2003.

While Section 171A.051 is limited to activity inside Texas, other provisions are vague and may allow lawsuits against people providing care entirely outside the state.

This ambiguity is not harmless, it's a threat. Out-of-state providers and supporters may stop helping Texans, not because it's illegal, but because they're afraid of being sued.

HB 5510 creates a market-share liability scheme that aims to make it legally risky for any company in the U.S. to manufacture or distribute medication abortion.

While the bill claims to allow an affirmative defense where medication abortion is used in a "medical emergency", that's cold comfort. Companies are extremely risk-averse when legal exposure is vague, and will likely over-comply rather than risk lawsuits.

The bill also encourages companies to monitor each other. If a manufacturer of a medication abortion pill can't be identified, liability is shared across all manufacturers based on national market share.

This is a deliberate attempt to export Texas law across state lines. If successful, it could severely disrupt access to essential medications used in both abortion and miscarriage care nationwide.

This bill dangerously and improperly includes the pre-Roe ban under the definition of Texas criminal abortion laws that the Attorney General has authority to enforce. A Texas Federal District Court has already found that this law has been repealed.

I am writing to you as a mother to three beautiful children whom I adore. Sadly for me, the path to motherhood was a difficult one marked by three miscarriages and at least two chemical pregnancies. I would imagine many people don't know enough about the subject to know what a chemical pregnancy is, so I will elaborate. A chemical pregnancy is a very early pregnancy loss that occurs before the 5th week. It is in no way viable and it has no symptoms, requires no medical treatment. For that reason, it's really only discovered by women who are tracking their fertility close enough that they are monitoring cycles and using pregnancy tests regularly. It appears as a positive on a pregnancy test but it will not progress at all; hope is quickly shattered. The pregnancy comes and goes within one cycle, and mercilessly does not culminate in the heavy bleeding and cramps of a more typical miscarriage. My three traditional miscarriages broke my heart and my husband's. All three were missed miscarriages, meaning my body did not terminate the pregnancy, although the had fetus died. The first time was likely ectopic and no heartbeat or fetus was ever detected on ultrasound but my hcg levels were rocketing upwards. I refused treatment but could hardly do anything but lay on my side or take warm baths for 2 weeks while my body fought. In two of the three losses I saw a heartbeat on ultrasound, each time the speed of it or the size of the fetus were red flags to my doctors who warned that the pregnancy was not viable. Each time I prayed for a miracle and was monitored on a weekly basis by my medical team. Each time, the heart stopped by week 8. The first two losses I prayed that modern science was wrong and that my baby continued to grow, refusing treatment (otherwise known as an abortion or abortion pills). The first time, I became pregnant in April and my body finally expunged the fetus in July. The second time I became pregnant in August. By the end of September I had lost the second baby, and again prayed that the doctors were wrong. I carried that dead fetus stubbornly in my body until January. In both cases I had become so ill I could barely function. So when I experienced a third missed miscarriage, I knew the right thing to do for my body, my future fertility, and my goals of becoming pregnant as soon as possible, was to undergo a medically necessary abortion. I'm so grateful I did. I was pregnant within two months of that and gave birth to a healthy baby girl. Women like me are forgotten with these sweeping laws that are written by lawyers and politicians instead of doctors. This bill will do far more harm than good. I beg you to reconsider. Whatever it is you hope to achieve, turning regular people against each other will only result in more division, more maternal deaths, more loss, more anger, more hate. I will pray and fight for protections, that these impossible decisions are made between women and their doctors, not politicians and fear mongers.

The bill's use of the term "unborn child" ignores these differences among faiths. Worse, the bill prevents not only pregnant women but their families, friends and faith leaders from practicing their faith and following their faith's beliefs, or even discussing their situation and options with their faith leader, if their beliefs are different than those codified by this bill. Enacting laws like this that impose one set of religious views on all Texans, especially knowing that many Texans have sincerely-held, deeply-felt beliefs that are very different from this bill's author and sponsors, violates both the federal and Texas constitutions.

The restrictions on abortion already enacted have had serious, even fatal, consequences on women, their fetuses and their families. Maternal and fetal mortality and children being born with birth defects and other serious and life-threatening conditions have increased. Texans who aren't pregnant have also suffered because the restrictions have caused some doctors to leave Texas and deterred doctors and medical students from moving to Texas. My name is Jennifer Perregrino, Executive Director for Pregnancy Assistance Center North. I am submitting this written testimony in favor of HB5510.

PACN is a faith-based, pregnancy medical clinic serving clients in Montgomery and Harris counties for over 35 years with 2 thriving locations. Our vision is to advance the culture for life in our community.

Recently, I needed medication for a persistent cough, so I made an appointment with my doctor. After the usual check-up procedures—vitals, symptom discussion with a nurse, and an exam by a doctor—he wrote a prescription and had it sent to a nearby pharmacy. At the pharmacy, before I could leave with the medication, I was required to have a consultation with the pharmacist to make sure I understood how to take the medication and if I had any questions. I left with a clearly labeled bottle with my name, the prescribing doctor's name, medication details, usage instructions, and any drug interactions or symptom warnings.

This is NOT what happens when a woman orders the abortion pills.

Although these medications are FDA-approved, they are being distributed illegally—without medical supervision, without confirmation of pregnancy or viability, and with no concern for a woman's health before or after the abortion.

Women are obtaining them through emails and apps, often receiving no instructions. Pills arrive in unmarked white envelopes, wedged between makeup pads, or tossed loosely into Ziploc bags with no labels or identifiers. One client recently brought us a bag containing 28 unlabeled pills. She didn't know what they were, where they came from, or how to use them. The uncertainty and fear led her to make an appointment at PACN.

Recent data shows that an estimated 19,000 Texans sought abortion pills online in one year and PACN estimates that 80% of our clients considering abortion are either contemplating or planning to take these pills.

This is why I'm urging you to vote in favor of HB5510. This bill seeks to fill an enforcement gap that is endangering the lives of women and their preborn babies, allowing abortion pill distributors to profit from and facilitate illegal abortions in our state. A state where abortion has been banned.

In addition, it targets the online advertising and trafficking of abortion drugs. This bill gives Texas the tools it needs to address the role of websites, apps, and financial service providers like PayPal and Stripe in facilitating these transactions.

I want to express my gratitude to Representative Leach for his leadership and unwavering commitment to this critical issue. Abortion has not ended in Texas—it has simply shifted, and the fight to protect life is far from over. This legislation represents an essential step in reinforcing Texas's dedication to supporting vulnerable women, ensuring they receive safe, responsible care, while also defending the lives of precious preborn children.

Members of the Committee, my name is Cindy Asmussen. I'm the Public Policy Advisor for the Southern Baptists of Texas Convention in which we have over 2,800 Texas churches. We support HB 5510.

The Texas Tribune reported in January that 2,800 Texans on average receive abortion-inducing medications through the mail every month from other states that still allow abortion, according to #WeCount, a tracking project from Society of Family Planning.

Chemical abortions not only result in the termination of innocent preborn children, but also pose health risks to women who use them, including heavy bleeding, infection, and other medical issues and increase the risk of coercion and abuse.

The Heritage Foundation has documented several cases from around the nation in their article titled, "Abortion Pills, Coercion, and Abuse".

For example, last year in Harris County a man was sentenced to 180 days in prison and 10 years probation for secretly slipping abortion drugs into his wife's beverages unbeknownst to her to forcibly abort their unborn child.

Last year in Louisiana a woman told her pregnant daughter, a minor, that "she had to take the abortion pill or else" which was obtained through the mail from a New York doctor's company. The young daughter, coerced to have an abortion she did not want to have, ended up in the emergency room after suffering significant bleeding. This same doctor also prescribed and mailed abortion pills to patients in Texas. Attorney General Ken Paxton filed a civil lawsuit accusing this New York doctor for practicing medicine in Texas without a license and violating the state's abortion ban.

Last year in Massachusetts a man was charged with poisoning, assault and battery on a pregnant woman, allegedly giving his girlfriend vitamin pills, in which he included misoprostol without her knowledge. She lost her unborn child after ingesting it.

In 2022, a Wisconsin man was sentenced to five years in prison for attempted first degree homicide of an unborn child for crushing up an abortion pill and putting it in his girlfriend's water bottle. She was about 20 weeks pregnant at the time.

These are just some of the cases. This bill is needed and will save the lives of women and children. It will provide a path for citizens to ensure the enforcement of our laws, including recourse against manufacturers and distributors, those mailing, delivering, or trafficking abortion pills, as well as holding Internet platforms, websites, and apps accountable for facilitating or advertising abortion pill sales.

Our Convention and 2,800 churches upholds the sanctity of life from fertilization to natural death, and urges the state to pursue all legal and legislative means necessary to protect both pre-born children and women from the devastating consequences of chemical abortions. Every human life begins at conception, bearing the image of God and deserving dignity, value, and protection. We urge you to pass HB 5510.

My name is Randi Streff, and I am a licensed healthcare professional serving patients in Texas. I would like to respectfully voice my strong opposition to House Bill 5510.

This bill places dangerous and unnecessary burdens on both patients and those who care for them. By threatening criminal and civil penalties for individuals who assist someone seeking an abortion — including providing transportation, information, or even emotional support — HB 5510 effectively criminalizes compassion.

I Oppose Texas House Bill 5510. I write this opposition not only on behalf of myself, but on behalf of my daughters should they one day choose to have children of their own in the state of Texas. HB 5510, under the guise of protecting life, is a direct assault on the bodily autonomy, health, and dignity of women and people with uteruses. It is a law that will harm far more lives than it claims to protect. Roughly 1 in 4 women will experience a miscarriage in their lifetime. That means nearly 25% of pregnancies will end naturally and involuntarily. Of those, many will require lifesaving medical intervention, including dilation and curettage (D&C) to remove tissue from the uterus and prevent infection, hemorrhage, or even death. This is not elective, it is emergency medicine. Yet D&C is the very procedure HB 5510 may criminalize under vague and sweeping language around abortion. Let us be clear: the same tools used for abortion care are also used for miscarriage management. You cannot legislate one without restricting the other. And in doing so, you are sentencing women to unnecessary suffering, permanent injury, or death. After SB 8 went into effect in 2021, legal abortions in Texas dropped dramatically, but that didn't mean women stopped needing them. What changed is that thousands were forced to seek unsafe alternatives or travel hundreds of miles, often out-of-state, for care. According to the Texas Policy Evaluation Project, after the 6-week ban, nearly 1,400 Texans per month were traveling out of state for abortions. Worse, physicians in Texas have repeatedly reported delaying medically necessary procedures, including those for miscarriages because of fear of legal repercussions. This Law is About Control, Not Life. If this bill were truly about the sanctity of life, it would support prenatal care, maternal leave, contraception access, and foster care reform. Instead, it seeks to criminalize the people most vulnerable in moments of crisis. Let me say it plainly, because it must be said: This law is about control over our 'holes,' not our ability to create life. Women's bodies are not public property. Men in Texas and across the United States have never had laws written about their bodies. They are not hunted down while seeking lifesaving care. They are not questioned at pharmacies, refused treatment due to politics, denied a vasectomy, Viagra, or prostate surgery due to the whims of legislators. And yet, across history, men have started wars over access to women's bodies. Our sexual organs—our "holes"—are seen as gateways to power and dominance, not humanity. This bill is not about babies. By targeting online pill providers and the tech companies that host abortion-related websites, HB 5510 infringes upon First Amendment rights. Restricting access to information about legal medical procedures in other states sets a dangerous precedent and hampers individuals' ability to make informed decisions about their health.

Constitutional Concerns

The bill's extraterritorial application represents a troubling expansion of Texas law beyond state boundaries, raising significant constitutional questions about interstate commerce and the right to travel. By attempting to regulate actions taken outside of Texas, this legislation violates fundamental principles of state sovereignty, which limits Texas's authority to its own borders. The Supreme Court in Bigelow v. Virginia (1975) explicitly rejected a state's attempt to regulate out-of-state abortion services, ruling that states cannot use internal police powers to restrict activities legal in other states.

By severely restricting access to medication abortion, which has a well-established safety record recognized by major medical organizations, this legislation may push pregnant individuals toward less safe alternatives. The narrow medical emergency exception fails to account for the full range of complex health situations that may necessitate abortion care. Healthcare providers facing potential criminal penalties will likely practice defensive medicine, potentially delaying critical care in ambiguous emergency situations where time is essential. This chilling effect will disproportionately harm rural residents who already face healthcare access challenges.

The bill's private enforcement mechanism, allowing individuals to sue anyone who "aids or abets" abortion access for at least \$100,000 per violation, creates a surveillance system that threatens privacy rights and community trust. This approach incentivizes frivolous lawsuits and could be weaponized against healthcare providers, counselors, family members, and digital platforms.

The bill's provisions regarding digital platforms raise serious concerns about online privacy and free speech. By threatening websites and digital services with liability, this legislation may force platforms to implement excessive content moderation or cease operations in Texas altogether, harming businesses and restricting information access.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on HB 5510.

HB 5510 is a bad bill that threatens Texans' liberty. It is almost certainly unconstitutional, as was proven by a federal judge's ruling over a similar statute in Alabama.

In the Alabama case, the judge ruled that neither the state attorney general, nor district attorneys across the state cannot prosecute individuals for helping pregnant Alabamians travel across state lines to access abortion care in states where abortion is legal. This includes health care providers and reproductive justice organizations.

As the judge ruled, the state has no business preventing citizens from freely traveling nor assisting others to do so.

In the ruling, Judge Myron Thompson said, "At its core, this case is simply about whether a State may prevent people within its borders from going to another State, and from assisting others in going to another State, to engage in lawful conduct there. . . . The court now answers no, a State cannot."

As someone who has an M.D., in particular I would like to comment on some of the dangers of having abortion pills sent by mail. Sending medication by mail without an in person evaluation by a doctor or follow up is basically practicing medicine without a license. In the ideal case a doctor should evaluate the patient's history and labs for conditions such as if the patient has a bleeding disorder, has anemia, is low on platelets (thrombocytopenia), or is taking medications that can make her more likely to bleed (aspirin etc). The patient's placental location should be evaluated for abnormal conditions such as placenta previa or placenta accreta which can make the woman more likely to bleed out. Similarly her uterus is not evaluated for abnormal conditions such as fibroids or if there are multiple babies which also complicate delivery. In the case the patient was to bleed out excessively (hemorrhage), there would be no preparation done for blood products that can be lifesaving. Afterwards, the patient would not be evaluated to check that all the fetal remains have been expelled which if it isn't, can predispose the patient to life threatening infection. The uterus would not be evaluated either for atony which would require medication to correct. Most importantly, the patient's vital signs and blood loss are not monitored. It thus appears to be very dangerous and irresponsible to send abortion pills through the mail without the women being evaluated in person. Thank you.
