A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

	AN ACT

- 2 relating to courses in personal financial literacy for high school
- 3 students in public schools.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 28.025, Education Code, is amended by
- 6 amending Subsections (b-1) and (b-23) and adding Subsection (b-24)
- 7 to read as follows:
- 8 (b-1) The State Board of Education by rule shall require
- 9 that the curriculum requirements for the foundation high school
- 10 program under Subsection (a) include a requirement that students
- 11 successfully complete:
- 12 (1) four credits in English language arts under
- 13 Section 28.002(a)(1)(A), including one credit in English I, one
- 14 credit in English II, one credit in English III, and one credit in
- 15 an advanced English course authorized under Subsection (b-2);
- 16 (2) three credits in mathematics under Section
- 17 28.002(a)(1)(B), including one credit in Algebra I, one credit in
- 18 geometry, and one credit in any advanced mathematics course
- 19 authorized under Subsection (b-2);
- 20 (3) three credits in science under Section
- 21 28.002(a)(1)(C), including one credit in biology, one credit in any
- 22 advanced science course authorized under Subsection (b-2), and one
- 23 credit in integrated physics and chemistry or in an additional
- 24 advanced science course authorized under Subsection (b-2);

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- 1 (4) three credits in social studies under Section
- 2 28.002(a)(1)(D), including one credit in United States history, at
- 3 least one-half credit in government and at least one-half credit in
- 4 [economics or] personal financial literacy [& economics], and one
- 5 credit in economics, world geography, or world history;
- 6 (5) except as provided under Subsections (b-12),
- 7 (b-13), and (b-14), two credits in the same language in a language
- 8 other than English under Section 28.002(a)(2)(A);
- 9 (6) five elective credits;
- 10 (7) one credit in fine arts under Section
- 11 28.002(a)(2)(D); and
- 12 (8) except as provided by Subsection (b-11), one
- 13 credit in physical education under Section 28.002(a)(2)(C).
- 14 (b-23) The agency shall:
- 15 (1) develop a list of free, open-source, and publicly
- 16 available curricula that may be used by a school district to provide
- 17 a personal financial literacy [& economics] course that satisfies
- 18 the curriculum requirement under Subsection (b-1)(4); and
- 19 (2) seek, accept, and spend any federal or private
- 20 grant funds and gifts that are available for the purpose of
- 21 providing a personal financial literacy [$\frac{\& economics}{\& economics}$] course as
- 22 part of the foundation high school program.
- 23 (b-24) In adopting rules under Subsection (b-1), the State
- 24 Board of Education shall allow a student to comply with the
- 25 curriculum requirement under Subsection (b-1)(4) for a one-half
- 26 credit in personal financial literacy by successfully completing an
- 27 advanced placement course designated by the State Board of

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- 1 Education as containing substantively similar and rigorous
- 2 <u>academic content.</u>
- 3 SECTION 2. Section 28.025(b-22), Education Code, is
- 4 repealed.
- 5 SECTION 3. Section 28.025(b-1), Education Code, as amended
- 6 by this Act, applies only to students entering the ninth grade
- 7 during the 2025-2026 school year or a later school year. For
- 8 students entering a grade above ninth grade during the 2025-2026
- 9 school year, Section 28.025(b-1), Education Code, as that section
- 10 existed before amendment by this Act, applies, and that section is
- 11 continued in effect for that purpose.
- 12 SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2025-2026
- 13 school year.
- 14 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 15 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 16 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 17 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 18 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
