- 14 (g) A person whose license or registration has been expired
- 15 for at least 90 days but not more than one year may apply for renewal
- 16 of the license or registration by paying to the commission a renewal
- 17 fee in an amount prescribed by commission rule not to exceed two
- 18 <u>times the normally required renewal fee.</u>
- 19 <u>(h)</u> A person whose license or registration has been expired
- 20 for <u>at least one year</u> [more than 30 days] may not renew the license
- 21 or registration. The person may obtain a new license or
- 22 registration by complying with the requirements and procedures,
- 23 including the examination requirements, for obtaining an original
- 24 license or registration.
