24	protect the identity of the student making the submission;
25	(2) be accessible through different platforms,

- 2 (b) The council shall review complaints or recommendations
- 3 submitted through the online portal on a regular basis to identify

- 8 Application Service and other relevant stakeholders, as authorized
- 9 by law; and
- 10 (2) compiled into a report to be:
- 11 (A) included in the council's report under

- 13 (B) posted on the council's Internet website; and
- 14 (C) submitted to participating students and the
- 15 standing legislative committees with primary jurisdiction over
- 16 <u>higher education</u>.
- 17 (d) The council shall establish procedures to ensure that
- 18 complaints and recommendations submitted through the online portal
- 19 are addressed in a timely and transparent manner, including by
- 20 developing:
- 21 (1) a tracking system to monitor the resolution of
- 22 <u>complaints and recommendations;</u>
- 23 (2) a mechanism to categorize submissions by topic and
- 24 urgency to prioritize responses effectively; and
- 25 (3) a process for notifying a student of actions taken
- 26 in response to the student's complaint or recommendation, excluding
- 27 information that would violate a student's expectation of privacy.

- 2 participating students, including by providing information during
- 3 student orientation, via e-mail, and through the program's Internet
- 4 website.
- 5 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 6 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 7 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 8 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 9 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
