HOUSE VERSION

SECTION 1. Section 153.010, Family Code, is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows:

(a) Subject to Subsections (c) and (d), if [H] the court finds at the time of a hearing that the parties have a history of conflict in resolving an issue of conservatorship or possession of or access to the child, the court may order a party to[:

[H)] participate in counseling with a mental health professional who:

(1) [(A)] has a background in family therapy;

(2) [(B)] has a mental health license that requires as a minimum a master's degree; and

(3) [(C)] has training in the dynamics of family [domestic] violence if the court determines that the training is relevant to the type of counseling needed[; and

[(2) pay the cost of counseling].

(c) In determining whether to order a party to participate in counseling under Subsection (a), the court shall consider evidence of family violence or sexual abuse in accordance with Section 153.004. If credible evidence of family violence or sexual abuse is presented, the court may not order counseling in which a victim of the violence or abuse participates in counseling sessions together with the perpetrator of the violence or abuse.

(d) A court may not order a party to participate in counseling under Subsection (a) in which the person conducting the counseling requires:

SECTION 1. Section 153.010, Family Code, is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows:

(d) A court may not order a party to participate in counseling under Subsection (a) in which the person conducting the counseling requires:

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
